

Morse Predicts HST Not to Run For Third Term

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne Morse, R-Ore., predicts that President Truman will not run for a third term and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will be his successor in the White House.

Morse, a liberal Republican, said at a press conference here that many GOP stalwarts said to be pledged to Sen. Robert Taft as the party's presidential nominee will bolt to the Eisenhower camp at the first opportunity.

"Most of them realize we must win," he said, "and we can win with Ike."

Morse said Sen. Richard Russell's announcement that he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination almost automatically put President Truman out of the running.

He said the Georgia senator's declaration meant that "every southern state will be pitted against Truman in the Democratic convention and thus his goose will be cooked."

Morse said his name was put forward as a presidential candidate in Oregon by pro-Taft forces attempting to divert votes from Eisenhower, but he plans to thwart the move by running as a delegate at large to the GOP convention.

They are available at Purucker's Piano House, Barker's Men's Store and Pruitt's Music Center.

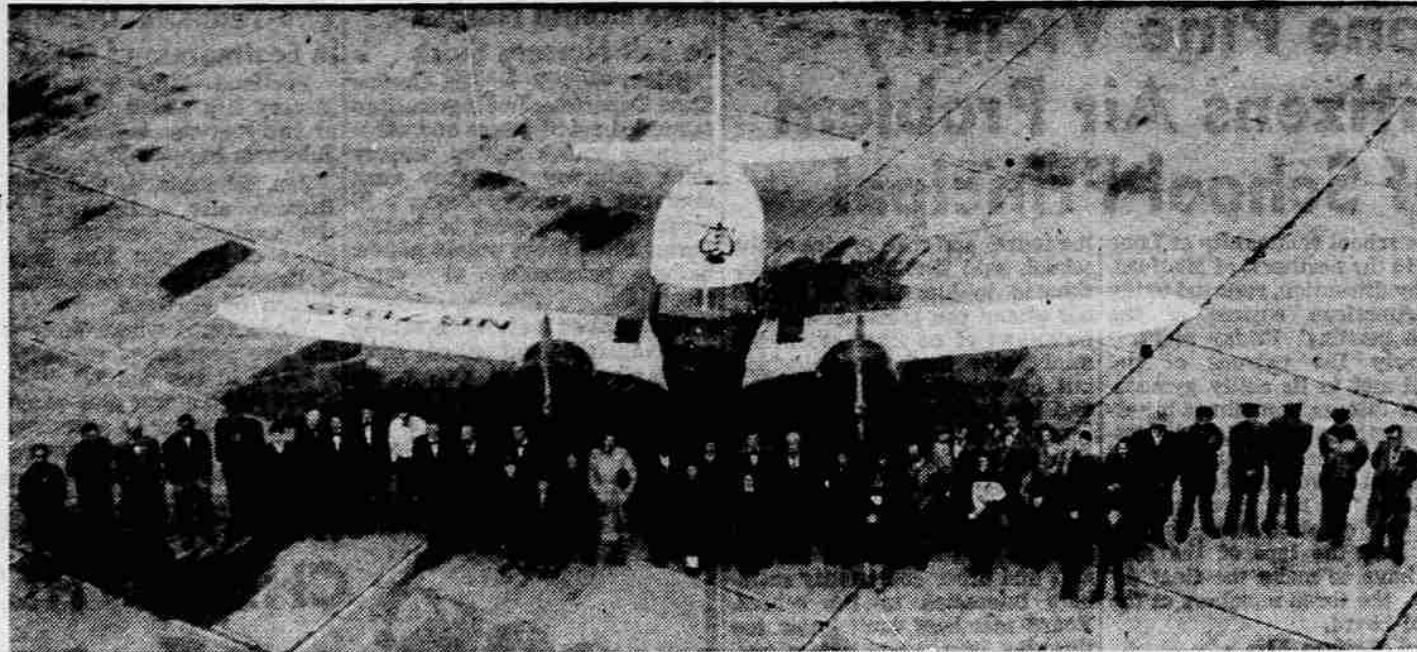
The event, which will draw quartets from all parts of the state, will be staged in the Medford high school auditorium March 22.

Sutton Promises Waste Exposures

Washington — (U.P.) — Rep. Pat Sutton (D-Tenn.), promised Saturday to expose more "waste" in the 2nd Army to follow up his charge that a plush \$50,000 hunting lodge was built at the taxpayers' expense for personal use of the commanding general.

A spokesman for Lt. Gen. Edward H. Brooks, commander of the 2nd Army at Ft. Meade, Md., denied there was a hunting lodge at the A. P. Hill military reservation near Bowling Green, Va.

But Sutton told the House the Army spokesman was "lying."

Swank Lodge—Sutton gave the House a first-hand report on his inspection trip to the reservation and a description of "the most magnificent lodge I have ever seen in my life."

He said the swank layout included the lodge with nine bathrooms, a beautifully equipped kitchen and dining room, a dice board hidden away behind the chimney in the attic and a "beautiful bath house" on the lake.

Increased NATO Aid Asked from Europe

Portland — (U.P.) — Most of the countries in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization are as financially able as the United States to put armies in the field, Rep. Harris Ellsworth said Saturday.

The Oregon Republican said too many people in Europe feel that the United States and Britain "somehow will take care of things" even if European cooperation is curtailed.

Ellsworth said our debt was as great as those of European countries, "and we are spending a larger proportion of our income on arms than are most of them."

"Europeans just don't realize that we are straining our financial resources," he said. Ellsworth referred specifically to France, where the Parliament rejected a tax bill intended partially for NATO financing.

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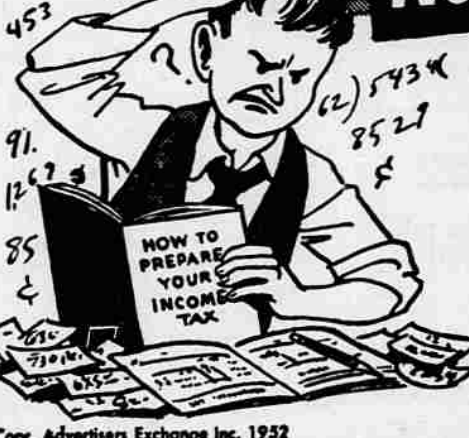
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
