# Entertaining Program Given by Dance Satirist

Pert and appealing Iva Kitchell, who pokes fun at serious dancers with hilarious and fascinating results, appeared in a program at Medford senior high school auditorium Saturday night under the sponsorship of Jackson County Civic Music association. It was Miss Kitchell's second appearance here and she was as warmly received as for her first.

Miss Kitchell is booked as a dance satirist, but she is more than that. She is, of course, a dancer and an exceedingly well-trained and capable one. In addition Miss Kitchell is a marvelous pantomimist and comedienne and has a personality which the audience loves.

While some of the program numbers were titled the same as for Miss Kitchell's first appearance here, she had changed and polished the acts. Indeed, some in the audience thought the acts which had been in Miss Kitchell's repertoire longer were better than the newer ones, and there is some foundation for this. "Carmen Kitchell From Kansas," "Non-Objective" and "Psychochondriac" were sharp and well-delineated, but in the last analysis, "The Vert Bros. (Intro and Extro)," "Portrait of a Hostess" and "Ze Ballet" are still the best.

While "Psychochondriac" brought lighter applause from the audience than other numbers, it has intriguing possibilities for an artist who is both

actress and dancer. In this number Miss Kitchell recites a monologue while dancing, something infrequently done, and in many ways the movements of the dance and the rhythm and intonations of the voice complement one another.

As before, the dancer's costumes were cleverly designed to enhance the theme of her dances and her costume changes between acts are still incredibly quick.

Miss Kitchell was assisted by Harvey Brown, composer-pianist, who provides music for her dances, often composing and improvising when nothing already written seems just right.

Next concert of the series will be the National Male quartet, March 14.—O. S.
