As We Live...

DON'T GIVE BABY AWAY: TAKE HUSBAND TO COURT

Q. "I have been married for three years now and it has been a living hell. I have three children, one by a former marriage, and am expecting another baby soon. My husband drinks and picks on all of us, especially my older child. He says dreadful things to me in front of the children and I can't take this much longer. When my new baby is born, I would like to put it up for adoption because I feel that it is unfair to a child to bring it into a home like ours."—N. M.

A. I agree that it is unfair to bring a baby into a home where a father drinks and mistreats his family. But the baby is yours and you should keep it with you at all costs.

No woman has to stand for mistreatment by her husband. Children in America today are

guarded by our courts against parental mistreatment. It is your responsibility to see to it that your home is a proper place to bring up your children.

Discuss this whole matter with your minister and ask him to make arrangements for you to take your case to a domestic relations court. When the judge knows about your husband's mistreatment, he will see to it that he treats his family properly or he will arrange for a legal separation, with support for you and the children.

When a man drinks, he is likely to say and do things he would not do if he were sober.

Drinking Blamed
Also, drink makes some people extremely quarrelsome. Your husband's attitude is due, in part at least, to his drinking. And, because your older child is the child of a former husband, he receives the brunt of your husband's mistreatment.

This, however, should not be tolerated. Your husband knew when he married that you had this child and he knew also that the child would live with you. If he did not want the child to be in his home, he should not have married you. But he did and it is now up to him to treat the child properly or pay the penalty.

If you have a personal problem.

"Leaflet" Battle Waged in Korea

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Chinese Communists temporarily dislodged Allied infantrymen from two advance positions on the western Korean front Sunday, while in the east both sides shelled each other with propaganda leaflets.

United Press Correspondent Fred Painton reported that on one section of the western battlefield, where opposing ground troops are entrenched "eyeball to eyeball," the air was dotted

with paper from harmless, air-bursting shells filled with leaflets.

According to Allied officers, Painton reported, the U. N. barrage—heavier by three to one over the Reds—was winning the duel of ideas. "We are getting an average of two to three North Korean deserters a day," said Capt. Charles Fogg of San Francisco.

Allied armor and Communist infantry probed each others' lines with neither side holding ground gained.

Vandenberg Again Heads Air Force Staff

Washington — (U.P.) — Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Air Force chief of staff, was tapped by President Truman Saturday for another 14-month term in the important defense post.

The White House said the president wanted to give Vandenberg the opportunity to complete 30 years of military service in his present job.

Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, commanding general of the strategic air command, will move up to vice chief of staff, and Gen. Nathan F. Twining, who has been vice chief, will take over LeMay's big bomber post.

The president's nomination of Vandenberg will be sent to the senate next week. Vandenberg's present four-year term expires April 30. He will be continued in his job until June 30, 1953.

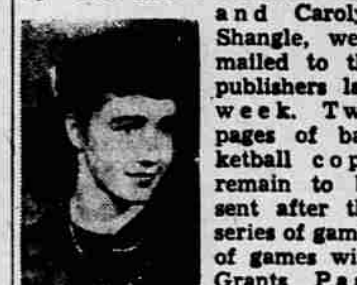
The nomination ends months of speculation at the Pentagon that Vandenberg might be on
