Forms of Government Explained at Meeting Of Gold Hill Women

Gold Hill—The differences between democratic, socialistic and communistic forms of government was the subject of the program presented by three junior students of Grants Pass High school, at a meeting of the Gold Hill Business and Professional Women's club Wednesday night at the home of Mrs. Agnes McLallen, North 99 highway.

The three students, Bonnie Pruitt, Mary Miller and Stewart Johnson, members of a history class taught by Miss Fern Trull, first vice-president of the Oregon Federation of BPW clubs, presented a flannelgraph demonstration which they had prepared as a class project. The script had been written by the students themselves, and they had also done their own research to obtain necessary material on the subject.

Miss Pruitt presented the features of democracy, Miss Miller those of socialism (as represented by the present government of Great Britain), and Stewart Johnson those of communism (as represented by the Russian government). The students gave the civil rights of the three forms of government, followed by a presentation of political and legal rights. The final category dealt with economic rights.

The program was part of the international relations phase of the club's yearly program, with Mrs. Belle Smith as head of the committee. The international relations theme for the year is "To Build a Free World." The meeting was conducted by the club president, Mrs. Vera Stewart.
