Fish and Power Issues of Pelton Dam Are Debated

Portland — (U.P.) — Rolin E. Bowles of the Izaak Walton League and Thomas W. Delzell of the Portland General Electric company debated the issues of the Pelton dam controversy here Monday.

Bowles told an audience at a Portland Chamber of Commerce forum that high dams will wipe out fish runs; Delzell argued that it is possible to have both power and fish.

The PGE official said "there is no appreciable salmon run on the Deschutes river at this time, but Portland General Electric company is prepared to spend \$4,000,000 in facilities and give the fish commission \$100,000 annually to try and create a run."

Bowles replied that "when anyone tells you you can have fish and high dams, they don't know what they're talking about." He cited the Merwin dam in Washington as an example, claiming that the spring chinook run there dwindled from 850 fish handled in 1939, in facilities similar to what PGE proposes at Pelton, to 19 fish in 1949.

But for officers behind the lines, the Korean war is a frustrating experience. The officers have been trained to handle fighting situations—to advance, to retreat, to encircle. But Korea is a stalemate.

The desire to smack 'em is strong.

Major Offensive Senseless But the UN command knows that a major offensive would be senseless unless Allied planes were allowed to attack Manchuria and other Communist sources of supply.

All of these high-level decisions cause scarcely a ripple of concern to the men in the front lines. GIs still grumble, but the combined chorus is as a whisper compared with last winter.

There are many reasons for this good morale.

Rotation Program Working First, and foremost, the rotation program is working—both the "Big R" and the "Little R." Big R is rotation home. Little R is a periodic rest and relaxation trip to Tokyo where the lights burn bright and refreshment is plentiful.

There are few men who have been forced to spend a second winter in Korea. New divisions have been brought in and the battle-scarred veterans have left quietly and gratefully for the states.

Clothing Improved The second big reason for the improved front line spirits is the improvement in clothing and the amount available. An intensive campaign of education in the use of winter equipment has been under way since last fall. And frostbite in most outfits is a court-martial offense.

O'Daniel To Pass Up Primary in Oregon

Portland — (U.P.) — W. Lee "Pap" O'Daniel will skip the biscuit passing in Oregon.

The ex-Texas senator and governor, who earlier said he might enter the Oregon presidential primary, told the Oregonian Tuesday that he will not file here.

The Texan's decision to forego the contest in Oregon May 16 does not mean he has necessarily given up his presidential aspirations, he said.

Steelhammer Seeks Attorney General Job

Trusty Walks Away From Oregon Prison

Salem — (U.P.) — Walter Cullen, 32, Oregon State Prison convict, escaped early Tuesday from the prison's farm annex, Warden Virgil O'Malley reported.

Cullen, a trusty, was working at the dairy barns and apparently just walked away. He was received from Umatilla county Jan. 17, 1948, to serve five years for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Puerto Ricans Favor Home-Rule Constitution

San Juan, Puerto Rico — (U.P.) — Puerto Ricans voted four to one in favor of their home-rule constitution Monday in a peaceful referendum.

Final returns showed 373,418 for and 82,473 against the constitution which gives this U. S. island territory almost complete autonomy in local affairs. It must be ratified by the U. S. Congress before it becomes fully effective.

LEARN ABOUT LINEN

Just as all that glitters is not gold, neither is all that's called linen actually that most marvelous of all "cold" fabrics.

True linen, whether the best imported or domestic variety or not, being a plant fiber, can stand a good deal of cleaning, both wet and dry. As a matter of fact, the beautiful effects of the best imported linens are produced when the plant fibers are allowed to "rot" in water. Anybody experienced with linen knows that as the garment is washed more and more it becomes softer and softer. And is at its best just this side of complete wearing out.

So there is no particular problem, although the same precautions with regard to stains and the like apply here as with any other good quality cloth.

With "imitation" linens, however, a number of precautions should be observed, especially if you're doing the cleaning in your own home. For one thing, synthetic linens contain rayon. This means that the linen-like fabric must be dealt with as though it were rayon. In other words, lower ironing temperatures. This will prevent scorching, the development of unpleasant luster or "shine," and precludes the possibility of actual melting. And naturally, spilled alcohol, nail polish or other substances which tend to dissolve cellulose acetate will also harm the linen-like fabric.

There are also a few linen-like garments found on the market made from "silk-linen." This material is actually silk—the "chapel" or discard created by re-using the short fibers which are rejected in combing silk. It must therefore be treated like true silk.
