French Soldier Held In Japan Bank Holdup

Tokyo—(U.P.)—Pvt. Edmond Parriel, a French soldier sought in connection with the \$6,000 Senju bank robbery, was arrested at gunpoint Tuesday.

He did not resist arrest, although he carried a loaded .45 caliber automatic pistol.

Parriel's arrest ended the largest manhunt of the occupation. Army agents and Japanese police found him sitting in the back seat of a Japanese taxi parked on traffic-jammed "T" avenue in Tokyo's Kamatsugawa district.

'Subversive' Teachers May Be Discharged

Washington—(U.P.)—The Supreme Court has armed states and cities with clear constitutional authority to fire "subversive" public school teachers, provided they are first given a hearing.

Legal experts placed the broad interpretation Tuesday on the court's 6 to 3 ruling upholding New York state's anti-Communist Feinberg law.

But authorities agreed that no constitutional significance could be read into another 6 to 3 decision, affecting public schools, which the court handed down Monday.

In that action, the court threw out the complaint of two New Jersey parents who challenged a state law authorizing Old Testament Bible readings and recitation of the Lord's prayer at school opening exercises.

Newly-Found Star Doubles Brightness

Berkeley, Calif.—(U.P.)—A star has been discovered which doubles in brightness within 10 minutes, according to the University of California astronomy department.

Dr. Olin J. Eggen, while making observations at the Commonwealth Observatory in Canberra, Australia, discovered the star, which has the shortest variation cycle known. It changes from its dimmest to its brightest every 80 minutes, and at the peak of the cycle doubles its brightness in 10 minutes.

Dr. Eggen pointed out that the 80-minute changes he observed actually took place on the star 120 years ago because it is 120 light years away from the earth.

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Medical Talks Draw Civil Defense Leaders

Col. Charles E. Stafford, Jackson county civilian defense director, and Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer and head of the CD medical program here, were among 65 civilian defense workers of the state to attend the second institute on the medical aspects of civil defense held in Portland last week-end.

Sponsored by the Oregon State Medical society, the State Board of Health and the Oregon Civil Defense agency, the meeting featured a talk by Dr. Harold M. Erickson, who pointed out that medical organization for defense purposes is also applicable to peacetime uses.

Dr. Erickson described the way in which medicine has been organized in the counties of the state, and said "the organizing and planning stages are about over. Now we need to concentrate on training and realistic exercises."
