Chinese Red Troops Set Up Check Point in Himalaya

Calcutta, India—(U.P.)—Chinese Communist troops in Tibet have been deployed to set up check posts along Bhutan's northern frontier, the newspaper Statesman's special correspondent in Kalimpong reports.
The report said the troops were sent from Gyantse, third largest Tibetan town, where Chinese troops arrived recently.
Bhutan is an independent Himalayan state comprising 18,000 square miles and lies on India's extreme northeastern frontier border. It has a population of some 300,000.
Bhutan is an Indian protectorate and is guided in its foreign relations by the Indian government under a treaty of friendship between the two countries in 1949.
In ancient times, the records show, China exchanged presents with Bhutan but did not try to take over.
The first known and recorded instance of intercourse between Bhutan and India goes back to 1774 when Warren Hastings, then governor general of India, sent a "John Company" (East India Company) officer on a good-will expedition to the court of the regent of Tibet via Bhutan. Cordial relations between Bhutan and British India were established at that time.
In 1866 the British made a treaty of friendship with Bhutan. In 1910 the treaty was amended to include a provision that Bhutan's foreign relations should be controlled by the British Indian government.
The Bhutanese are a sturdy mountain people with Tibetan affinities.
They share the religion and culture of Tibet and look to the Dalai Lama as their spiritual head. Bhutan is politically independent of Tibet. The ruler is the hereditary Maharaja of Bhutan. His Highness Sir Jigme Wangchuk.
The only security measures observed by the Bhutanese government is the posting of Bhutanese "policemen" to guard all important passes and roads leading to

and from Tibet.
Because Bhutan's defense, like its external affairs, is managed by India, it is left to be seen what military precautions, if any, Indian military authorities will adopt with the shadows of Red China's armed might clearly outlined on the country's northeastern frontier.
