World Prayer Day Observed in City By Women's Council

The sanctuary of Medford Church of the Nazarene was filled to capacity last Friday afternoon when women of the county gathered there to observe the annual World Day of Prayer with a service of prayer, meditations and special music.

The program, under the theme "Christ, Our Hope," dedicated to a better understanding of the needs and problems of the underprivileged of this and foreign countries, was presented by members of the Medford Council of Church Women.

The Rev. Vernon Wilcox of the Church of the Nazarene gave the opening devotion following which Mrs. Frank Heller, program chairman, introduced Roy McCorkel, world traveler and lecturer, who is associated with CARE in Southern Europe. Mr. McCorkel told of a recent visit to the Holy Land and of the great poverty in a land where Christ ministered to the poor so long ago. He stated that "for today's consideration we should take a deeper look into the meaning of today's complexities and endeavor to live a religion relevant to our times; a religion which comes to the defense of the minorities. Christians must awaken to the fact that we are living in new dimensions where the need for brotherly love and understanding are ever increasing in value toward better world conditions."

A film strip, "The Kingdom Come" which pictured the need for CARE and uplift among those who work close to the soil was presented by Mrs. George Flanagan with Mrs. Grover Corum, narrator. Mrs. W. B. Clegg, devotional chairman, led in the special prayers and meditations. She was assisted by Mrs. Boyd Harlow, who gave the prayer for migrants, Mrs. Victor Birdseye, sharecropper prayer; Mrs. Gilbert Gross, the student; Mrs. W. T. Frost, Sioux Indian; Mrs. George Bolster, Chinese and Mrs. R. Pence, Mexican. Mrs. George Sherman read the poem "Psalm of an Indian Shepherd" which was written by a Navajo student.

Special musical selections were given by Mrs. Ralph Matlack, accompanied by Miss Beverly Lyman, and the Methodist Women's quartet composed of Mrs. Howard Bush, Mrs. Horace Doolen, Mrs. Frank Blar and Mrs. A. K. Morse. Mrs. John Eby, who was organist for the afternoon, accompanied them.

Mrs. J. M. Ball, council treasurer, gave a report on the growth of giving to missions in the United States. She stated that in 1951, the amount received for mission work during World Day of Prayer, totaled \$290,000.

State Nutritionist Speaks for Group

Butte Falls—Butte Falls home extension unit sponsored a community meeting on the subject of good nutrition in the high school February 28. Miss Van Tine, state nutritionist, was introduced by Miss Jean Parker of the Jackson county health office.

The importance of pasteurized milk and how the rural homemaker can do her own pasteurizing was one topic of lively discussion. Other topics were fresh, and properly preserved and cooked vegetables. Miss Van Tine said that the use of iodized salt tended to soften the texture of canned vegetables and therefore was to be avoided in vegetable canning. Meat and meat substitutes are invaluable in the growth process and the best way to obtain enough vitamin D is to use it in concentrated form, the speaker said.

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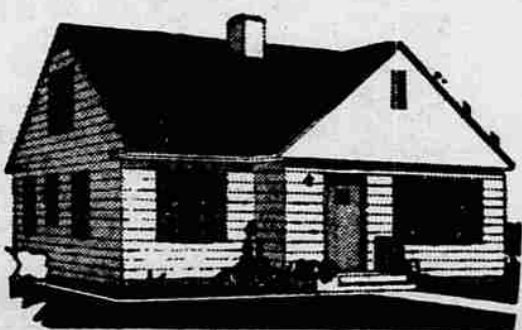
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
