Camp White Patient Dies; Burial First In New Cemetery

Albert Paul, 56, a member of the Camp White domiciliary, died at the Veterans Administration hospital in Portland, Tuesday.

Funeral services will be held in the Camp White chapel at 2 p. m. Friday, with Chaplain Henry Anderson officiating.

Burial will follow in the new Camp White cemetery east of Eagle Point. Graveside services for Mr. Paul will be the first at the new veterans plot, which was started last year and will be completed soon. The funeral service tomorrow will be the first conducted from the Camp White chapel. The new cemetery will be dedicated on Memorial day.

In World War I—Mr. Paul was born in California on April 22, 1895. He served as a private in Company G, 127th infantry, from 1917 to 1919. His survivors include his wife, in Grants Pass, and a son, Donald, in Vancouver, Wash.

Members of veterans organizations and friends have been asked to attend the services tomorrow. A spokesman for the Military Order of Cooties and Lady Bugs said their members are to attend.

Attempt to Evict Orphans Thwarted

Chicago, Jan. 1 (U.P.)—Forty-two orphans are secure in their home on Chicago's south side after a four-year attempt to evict them finally had been thwarted.

Judge John F. Haas in Superior Court held invalid a city zoning ordinance which would have forced the Illinois Protestant Children's home to find new quarters.

Home owners in the neighborhood had joined the city and spent four years in a legal fight to oust the orphans. They contended that only single family dwellings were legal in the area.

Chicago (U.P.)—A social studies professor believes youngsters begin the study of history too early in life.

Prof. Leo J. Alilunas of State Teachers College, Fredonia, N.Y., made the assertion in an article in the University of Chicago Elementary School Journal.

"There is real doubt if third or fourth grade children are psychologically ready to search for old records in attics, to question the descendants of early settlers, or to discuss land deeds with their classmates," Alilunas said.

He said children do not have a natural interest in the past.

Warrants To Be Given On Unpaid Tickets

The Medford police department reported today that warrants will be issued for non-payment of overparking fines effective at once. After warrants have been issued the regular 50-cent overparking fine will be increased to \$5, officers stated.

The 50-cent fine may be paid by mail or in person during the first 24 hours after the citation is issued. Persons paying by mail may use envelopes provided by the city without paying postage. Any time after the 24-hour period and prior to issuance of a warrant, the fine will be \$1.

The police department stated this morning that response to overparking citations by mail has been heavy since the city started placing franked envelopes on all cars violating the city ordinance.
