Hollywood — (U.P.) — In this award-happy community, even a hamburger stand is handing out "Oscars" this year.

Everybody from fan magazines to movie unions bestows honors before the staid Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences gets around to choose last year's winners.

Paul Douglas and Ray Milland to hordes of hungry and hopeful thespians, will mark ballots labeled "Hamburger Academy of Arts and Sciences." And the winners will be feted at a hamburger banquet, making this one award dinner where they'll weep from onions instead of from acceptance speeches.

Scheduled March 19. This outstanding event of the social award season will be staged March 19—only one night before the academy presents its own awards.

"We'll have one searchlight out in front, too," said actress Marilyn Conrad, who with her husband, ex-actor Harry Lewis, runs the swanky hamburger stand.

"And everybody will wear blue jeans. Not many of the actors who come here own tuxedos."

The honored guests will be handed, with suitable fanfare, gold replicas of Hamlet and Ophelia. These statuettes will be inscribed, in suitable hamburger language, "well done for your rare performance in the motion picture medium."

Celebrities Plentiful. You can find more celebrities and future Oscar winners these days at the Hamburger Hamlet, on nightclub row, the Sunset strip, than inside the gates of MGM. The Hamlet serves such Hollywood fare as burgundy wineburgers at 70 cents and rum cheesecake at 50 cents to devotees like Hedy Lamarr, Burt Lancaster and Jeff Chandler.

The room where the "Hamlets" and "Ophelias" will be handed out is decorated with plaster figures of Shakespeare characters, scenes and such hamburgered quotations as, "broil

the hamburger, trippingly, I pray thee...

Customers Dreamed Awards. Mrs. Lewis said the cash customers dreamed up the awards.

"The actors who come here thought the stars would like to be honored by those who aspire to be in their shoes," she explained.

"I'm sure the winners will show up, too. They couldn't let down a group of people like this."

Last year a group poked fun at the movie awards, too. The Hollywood press handed out "Mickey" trophies after suffering through umpteen award dinners.

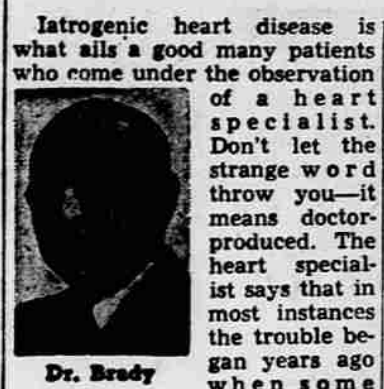

WATCH OUT FOR TRICKS OF THE TRADE, FOLKS

Introgenic heart disease is what ails a good many patients who come under the observation of a heart specialist. Don't let the strange word throw you—it means doctor-produced. The heart specialist says that in most instances the trouble began years ago when some

bumbling doctor heard a murmur and dismissed the patient with the advice to take things easy and avoid unnecessary activity—but failed to say what, if anything, was wrong with the heart.

There is a widespread popular notion that physical activity, exercise, work, play, recreation is harmful to anyone with heart disease of any kind. Unfortunately some half — some physicians share this belief or, if they know better, they haven't the know-how to prescribe the kind and degree of physical activity that will be most beneficial to the individual patient.

In every case of valvular disease, leakage, incompetency, insufficiency gradually increasing physical activity is an important as rest or medicine for successful treatment.

Persons who have coronary thrombosis unquestionably keep in better condition and are less likely to have another "attack" if they lead a reasonably active life instead of trying to avoid physical activity.

If you are handicapped that way it would do your heart good to talk with some of the coronarians on our bowling green.

My advice to any reader who has an unexplained murmur is consult a physician for an opinion as to its significance. If the physician is honest he or she will give an opinion or tell you frankly that he doesn't know whether it means anything or not.

At any rate this is a fact which no physician will deny: A doctor who says a patient has a murmur but fails to give an opinion as to the significance of the murmur or at least acknowledge he doesn't know what it means takes advantage of the patient's ignorance and credulity.

Don't let it happen to you, stupid.

Firemen Buy Hall At Rogue River

Rogue River—Fire Chief Gordon Hatch and 2nd Assistant Douglas Buckle attended the council meeting Tuesday evening and reported the Volunteer Firemen have taken over the brick building on Broadway, which was erected by the I.O.O.F. lodge about 1911 or 1912. It was purchased on contract for \$4,000. They plan to remodel the entrance and install wide doors with funds from the Firemen's ball and the following dances to be held in the city park this summer.

The building will provide ample room for housing the four pieces of firefighting equipment,

the Ford, GMC, Marquette and a jeep for brush fires. There will also be space for drying hose as well as room for the men to train.

City to Aid
The city council voted to contribute \$500 to the fire department and it was recalled when the city renewed their fire protection contract with the volunteer firemen the old rate of \$800 was used instead of 4 mills which would have netted \$1300.

The special committee appointed to locate a site for a new city hall reported there are two lots on Oak street which are available.

Hams Valuable Aids at Disaster

Birmingham, Ala. — (U.P.) — Emergency communication aids of amateur radiomen proved of such value at a Woodstock, Ala., train disaster that 11 "hams" were deputized to perform the same service again.

Sheriff Holt McDowell said the help of amateur radiomen proved invaluable after two streamliners collided killing 17

persons and injuring 60 others. He said only two telephones were available to shaken passengers and emergency crews.

The sheriff said the men will have authority to go to the scene of future tragedies and assist in communications.
