

Blood Affected in Animals Exposed To Atom Radiation

Los Angeles —(U.P.)—Atomic bomb field tests have proved that an iron-bearing protein is released into the blood streams of animals exposed to atomic radiation, sometimes causing internal hemorrhaging, it was disclosed Wednesday.

The discovery first was made by Drs. Thomas J. Haley and Richard F. Filey of the atomic energy project of the University of California at Los Angeles Medical Center in 1951.

Rats, Dogs Affected

They discovered that the protein, called ferritin, was released in the blood streams of rats exposed to x-ray radiation. Identical effects were found in dogs exposed to atom bomb explosions, they revealed.

Haley said the radiation caused paralysis of the peripheral vascular blood circulation, causing the liver to release abnormal amounts of ferritin, which is associated with the iron transport system in the body.

the normal balance of the blood stream, said Haley, and when the greatest amount of ferritin is present in the bloodstream, "the irradiated animals are experiencing internal hemorrhaging."

Time Running Out for Mac To Take Name Off Ballot

Salem—(U.P.)—Time is running out on Gen. Douglas MacArthur's chances of having his name removed from the Oregon primary ballot as candidate for the Republican nomination for president.

Attorney General George Neuner has ruled that his name must remain on, under a ruling of Oregon law made by the State Supreme Court in 1916, although MacArthur has personally requested that his name be withdrawn.

Court Order Necessary

Neuner said only a court order could get MacArthur's name off the ballot, and there, too, time is running out.

The deadline for filing for office in Oregon is next Friday, March 7. The State Election Bureau must mail a certification of ballot information to each of Oregon's 36 counties by March 15.

March 21 Deadline

After that a court could order a candidate's name off the ballot until the ballots are printed by each county, or up to March 21. Even after that a court could order printed ballots destroyed and new ones printed up to five days before the election—in this case May 16, the day of Oregon's primary. But Dave O'Hara, head of the State Election Bureau told the United Press Wednesday that no such order has

ever been made in Oregon. Five days before the election, county clerks must turn over all ballots printed and all other election equipment and supplies for polling places to the sheriffs for delivery to officials of election boards. And once that is done, not even a court could order the name of a candidate removed or ballots destroyed.

Notes from the BEET SUGAR KITCHEN



MAGIC LEMON PIE



Perfect for Springtime. A magical, self-forming, two-textured filling... a sponge-like top above a smooth, creamy custard.

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup Beet Sugar
- 2 tbsps. all-purpose flour
- 1 cup milk
- 4 tbsps. lemon juice

In mixing bowl, beat egg whites until stiff; set aside.

In a larger bowl, beat yolks until thick and lemon-colored.

To yolks, slowly add sugar, flour, then milk and lemon juice, beating until well mixed (batter gets very thin).

Fold-stir in egg whites until they become tiny white puffs in the batter.

Pour filling into 9-inch unbaked pie shell.

Bake in a hot oven (400° F.) 10 min. Reduce heat to moderate (350° F.) for 35 min. or until shell is golden brown.

Remove from oven. Cool completely. Serves six.

PIE POINTERS

To prevent runovers, make edge of pie into a "stand up" collar; fit pastry into pie pan; trim it 1/4 in. beyond pan edge. Fold overhang under to build up edge; crimp.

As THE PIE COOLS

TRIM TRICKS From leftover pastry scraps, cut out 6 daffodils for Spring, or shamrocks for St. Patrick's Day (March 17th), and dust with yellow or green colored sugar. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in very hot oven (450° F.) about 7 minutes. Cool on cake rack. Place one atop each serving of pie.

To color sugar. Blend 12 drops food coloring with 1/2 cup Beet Sugar. Let dry on wax paper.

Here's the easy way for wonderfully flaky, tender crust every time. Makes 2 shells or 1 double crust for 9-inch pie.

- In a bowl, stir-cut 1 cup shortening into 1/2 cup boiling water.
- Add, all at once, 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour and 1 teaspoon salt.
- Mix ingredients together until well combined.
- Chill before using.
