Trust Is a Part of Love—So Don't Marry Without It

(Q) "I am 17 and in love with a fellow who is 18. He is very jealous. No matter where I go or what I do, he doesn't trust me and has told me so. I have been going with him for three years and we have broken up three times for this reason. He has asked me to accept him back and go on with plans for our wedding. Do you think I should accept him back?"

(A) You would be absolutely crazy to marry this boy unless he changes radically. In the first place, you are both too young to consider such a serious step.

Is this boy in a financial position to marry you now? Does he have enough saved up to pay the expenses of a wedding and the establishment of a home? And, even more important, has he enough in reserve to meet any emergency, such as sickness?

Even if he is in a financial position to marry you now, do you want to marry a person who does not trust you and makes no bones about it? How could you be happy with a person who reminded you constantly that he did not trust you?

Jealousy is a hard emotion to live with. You have had a taste of it during your courtship. If the strain of it has been too much for you and has caused you to break up three times, how could you stand the day-in, day-out strain?

May Renew Friendship

It is quite all right to renew your friendship with this boy if you are fond of him, in spite of his jealousy and his distrust

of you. But, keep it on the friendship basis with no thought whatsoever of marriage.

Don't even make the mistake of going steady with him. Accept his invitations for dates when you want to be with him but renew your friendships with other boys and make new friends. Get back into circulation and have a good time.

Don't Make Same Mistake

Later, when you find other young men you are fond of, don't make the mistake again of limiting yourself to one who is so jealous of you that he refuses to trust you. 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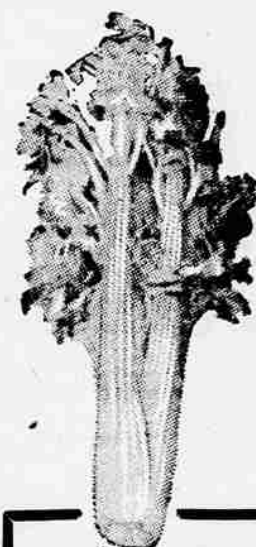
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
