Selection certain to satisfy the tastes of all persons who love fine music will be included in the Sunday afternoon recital of Theodor Haig, according to Mrs. Cay Huffman, instructor in music at Southern Oregon college. The New York concert pianist will appear at the Lithia theater, Ashland, in a 3 o'clock program, Sunday, March 9.

Included in the four-part recital will be numbers by such well known piano masters as Mozart, Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Shumann, Brahms, Chopin, Albeniz, Debussy and Liszt. The pianist, who has been playing since childhood, has given professional concerts in this country, Canada, South America, Europe and Africa. He recently returned from an engagement in Honolulu.

The piano, however, is only one of two careers, for he is exceptionally known in the New York area for the joint radio programs with his wife, Ruby Mercer. Their "Mr. and Mrs. Mercer" program on WNYC is now augmented by "Music We Like" four-week shown on WOR.

Mr. Haig is currently spending much of his time as accompanist for the ballerina Svetlana. She will accompany the musician to Ashland and will attend the Sunday concert, Mrs. Huffman said.

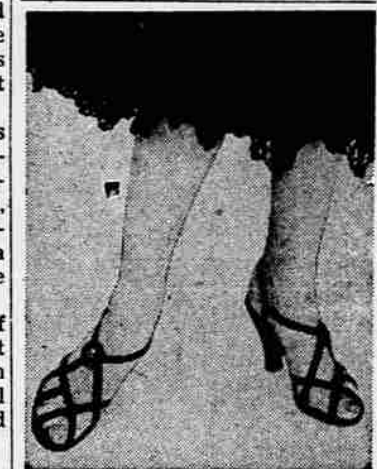

Hot'n Hearty One-dish Dinner

6-oz. elbow macaroni, cooked
1 can blue lake green beans
1 can tomato sauce
1 can beef broth
1 cup minced onion
1 cup minced green pepper
1 cup minced carrot
1 cup minced celery
1 cup minced parsley
1 cup minced dill
1 cup minced chives
1 cup minced basil
1 cup minced oregano
1 cup minced thyme
1 cup minced rosemary
1 cup minced sage
1 cup minced marjoram
1 cup minced tarragon
1 cup minced fennel
1 cup minced dill weed
1 cup minced chervil
1 cup minced tarragon
1 cup minced fennel
1 cup minced dill weed
1 cup minced chervil



During time macaroni is cooking (in boiling salted water), drain beans; boil liquid rapidly until reduced to 1/4 cup. Add enough milk to make 1 1/2 cups; reserve. Drain liquid from tuna into saucepan; add 1 lb. butter. Stir in flour, paprika and dry mustard. Add liquid and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Add drained beans and tuna; heat to serving temperature. Toss hot cooked macaroni with remaining ingredients. Arrange macaroni around platter; turn bean mixture in center. Sprinkle macaroni around platter; garnish with toast cut with fish cookie cutter.



Serves 6. If desired, platter may be garnished with toast cut with fish cookie cutter.



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
