HELP ALCOHOLIC HUSBAND CURB HIS DRINKING URGE

(Q) "My husband is a hard-working, good man. He loves his four children and me very dearly. The only fault he has is to go out about once a month and drink until he can't stand up. It is hard to convince him not to drive the car and he already has a charge against him for drunken driving. Another charge against him would mean the loss of his job and the breaking up of our home. He keeps doing this in spite of the promises he makes. What can I do to help him?"

(A) Your husband's promises are worthless when he has the urge to drink. Don't ask him to make such promises again. It makes him feel inadequate and ashamed when he breaks his promises to you.

Instead, ask him to tell you when he feels the urge to drink coming on him. He knows the symptoms from past experiences and can readily identify them. Then when he warns you of his urge, take away his car keys so he cannot drive the car and keep him in the house, by force if necessary.

He may put up a protest and make it difficult for you but knowing how much is at stake, you should be willing to make any sacrifice. When he is at home, you can also have some control over the amount of whiskey he drinks.

Talk to your doctor about this matter and see if he has any suggestions that may help your husband to cure this drink urge. If he feels that your husband would profit by joining Alcoholics Anonymous, ask him to talk to your husband about the matter and make arrangements for him to get in touch with the organization.

Sincere in Desire

Because your husband is willing to promise you that he won't drink heavily any more, he is sincere in his desire to cure himself. But, the urge is stronger than his desire not to drink, and that is why he gives in to the urge. To overcome the urge, he needs professional help.

There is no question about the fact that you must treat this matter as a serious one. With your husband cannot afford to lose his job or ruin the children's chances for success in your community because of his bad reputation. That is why you must act at once.

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CAT STEALING OKAYED

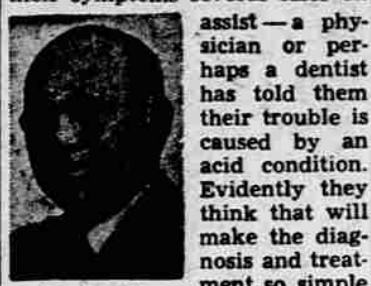

THAT HANDY A CID CONDITION

Every day among the scores of readers who insist on reciting their symptoms several offer an

assist—a physician or perhaps a dentist has told them their trouble is caused by an acid condition. Evidently they think that will make the diagnosis and treatment so simple that even I can handle it by mail.

This acid condition is handy to have around the office. It keeps the poor geeks guessing, even the smart ones who know as much as the quack himself knows about the conventional diagnostic dodges, such as "your nerves," "auto-intoxication," "toxicosis" and "indigestion."

I have often wondered what use people not under the care of a physician can have for lists of foods that leave acid, alkaline or neutral ash. Perhaps some seer has told them they have an acid condition.

In health and in most acute and chronic illnesses the body tissues and the blood are neutral or slightly alkaline. In some serious illnesses an acid condition may develop, and this acidosis, as physicians call it, is a serious complication which requires vigorous emergency treatment. This being a health column we may mention only diabetes as an instance of such illness. Every diabetic should be instructed about this by his physician, and every diabetic's family should be on the alert for any unusual drowsiness or stupor, which calls for immediate medical care.

For the special benefit of the knuckleheads who can read here are some truths which no ordinary doctor, specialist or authority can deny:

No blood test will show whether an individual has cancer.

No electrical, radio, cosmic ray or other gadget will detect the presence of, or show the site of, any disease the dupe may have.

X-ray examination (fluoroscope or picture) in the diagnosis of disease is hardly worth the price except as the x-ray evidence is interpreted by the technician (laboratory expert) in co-operation with the patient's physician, and even in such circumstances it is not decisive, as too many gullible customers imagine.

The quack who has only to learn what your chief complaint may be in order to sit back and tell you what to eat or what not to eat or what medicine to take or what beverage to drink to avoid or what kind of bath to take or whether you need a change of climate, behaves that way because he knows you are a sucker. Didn't you come to him, rather than go to a reputable physician because he blows his own horn?
