

Annual Round-Up Dated by Posse, June 14, 15 Set

June 14 and 15 have been set as dates for the annual Rogue River round-up sponsored by the Jackson County Mounted Sheriff's posse, according to W. M. Lemmon, captain. The dates were set at a meeting of possemen this week.

Frank Christian was appointed show chairman. Serving with him will be Bob Reynolds, James Finegan, Clarence Harrison and Stan Morgan.

The show will be presented at the posse grounds and Christian Brothers of Eugene will furnish the rodeo stock, Lemmon said. This will be an RCA approved rodeo show, the captain added.

Building Planned

Chutes, corrals and catch bins for stock at the posse grounds were completed last week, and Sunday, March 9, possemen expect to build a 40-horse tie shed. Bleachers to accommodate from 2,000 to 3,000 persons will be completed in the near future, Lemmon said. All possemen are to be at the grounds at 9 a. m. each Sunday to ready the grounds for the show, the captain added.

Women of the auxiliary, the Ladies Mounted troop, will furnish a potluck luncheon at noon for those working.

At the meeting a social evening was planned for Saturday night, March 15, at the club house. Josephine County Mounted Sheriff's posse and auxiliary members are also invited. There will be square and round dancing and refreshments.

Marines Repel Five Small Enemy Attacks

8th Army Headquarters, Korea —(U.P.)— First Division marines drove off five small enemy attacks in their sector of the eastern front Friday, winning each of the skirmishes in less than 25 minutes.

Met by Machine Guns

The first attack, two squads strong, hit the Marine line early Friday morning and a few minutes later a third Communist

squad rushed another Leatherneck position.

Both Communist groups ran into murderous machine gun and automatic rifle fire.

The other Red probes developed about dawn.

An 8th Army communiqué said UN forces along the western and central fronts reported light patrol actions with enemy units up to a platoon in strength.

Enemy Lines Attacked

Meanwhile, 5th Air Force fighter-bombers dived through low-hanging clouds to attack enemy rail lines, troops and artillery positions in northwestern Korea.

The cloud cover limited the number of sorties flown to 200. F-80 Shooting Stars silenced two anti-aircraft positions and killed 12 enemy soldiers. The Shooting Stars also cut rails on the Suncheon-Pyongyang line and destroyed a rail bridge north of Omgjin.

Photographer's Model Files Damage Claim

Los Angeles —(U.P.)— A pretty photographer's model Friday demanded \$100,000 damages from an advertising firm she accused of retouching a photograph to make it appear that she posed in the nude.

Brunette Mrs. Joan Evans, 25, filed the fraud suit Thursday against Dean Simmons, president of an advertising company she said distributed the picture of her in an ad for a shower bath appliance.

Mrs. Evans, wife of an Air Force officer, said she wore a bathing suit when she posed for the photo and was told that only her head and shoulders would appear in the picture.

She charged that Simmons conspired to have the picture retouched so that it appeared she was posing in the nude and then distributed the advertisement to publications throughout the country.

Stevenson Against Name on State Ballot

Springfield, Ill. —(U.P.)— Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson says he does not approve of their efforts to get his name on the Oregon primary ballot.

Stevenson commented Thursday night on petition being circulated in Oregon for the May 16 primary. The Illinois governor, often mentioned as a dark horse candidate for the Democratic nomination, said he has "no other ambition" than to be governor of Illinois.

Directors Discuss 1952 Shakespeare Festival Planning

Directors of the Oregon Shakespearean festival discussed the 1952 season's plays, directors, ticket prices, building and landscaping plans at a meeting held last night in the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Allen Jr., on the Rogue river. Rodney Keating, chairman, presided.

The board voted to hold membership and admission prices at last year's level, and later will investigate the possibility of issuing student tickets. Leaves-of-absence for one year each were granted to Mrs. I. E. Schuler, Medford, board member, and James Sandoe, University of Colorado, play director.

Tells of Plays

Angus Bowmer, producing director, spoke briefly of the coming season, the four plays and the directors chosen. He stated that Allen Fletcher, former director who has been on leave of absence, will come up from California to direct "Julius Caesar." Phil Hansen will direct "Henry V," Richard Graham "The Tempest," and Bowmer will direct "Much Ado About Nothing."

Bowmer also displayed architect's sketches of proposed building improvements, including balconies. These were referred to the building committee.

He also spoke of plans to expand the musical part of the plays and festival. Music this year will be directed by Hans Lamp, authority on Elizabethan music from the University of Southern California.

Remodeling OK'd

Ralph Burgess, association treasurer and member of the building committee, was given permission to remodel a portion of the Shakespearean festival shell in order to provide a room where costumes may be made and remodeled and fittings held. In the past, this has been done in quarters provided by Southern Oregon college on the campus.

Bill Dawkins, executive secretary of the association who recently returned from a special assignment at the University of New Mexico, attended the meeting. Dawkins stated that he will keep "irregular hours" at the festival office in the Lithia hotel for the next several weeks.

The meeting followed a buffet supper served by the Allens.

10 Race Horses Perish as Stable Damaged by Fire

Pleasanton, Cal. —(U.P.)— A fire that roared through a haystack in a barn at the historic Pleasanton race track cost the lives of 10 thoroughbred horses and caused damage estimated at more than \$125,000, authorities said Friday.

Some 20 other valuable horses, all destined to race at Golden Gate Fields' spring meeting opening next Wednesday, were injured when the fire razed a 300-foot barn in the middle of the stable area.

The fire broke out shortly after 6:30 p. m. Thursday, possibly from a stove in one of the stalls, menacing more than 600 horses. About half of them were in training for the Golden Gate Fields meeting.

Some 150 horses were turned loose by the firefighters. They galloped in terror over the countryside, bruising and lacerating themselves as they plunged blindly into trees, barbed wire and other obstructions.

He asked for a night's lodging in a cell, but police turned him down three times.

N. Hampshire County Holds Eyes of Nation In Primary Election

Concord, N. H. —(U.P.)— It's not true that as Maine goes so goes the nation in an election. But in every election since 1922 it's been true of Strafford county, New Hampshire.

That's why the eyes of the nation will be on Strafford county Tuesday when the New Hampshire primary will be held. President Truman, Eisenhower, Taft, Kefauver and the other persons entered in the primary may get a pretty good idea how they stand with the voters at this moment.

Close to Cross-Section

Strafford county, with a population of 51,000, lies in the southeastern section of the state. It contains three cities. Rochester normally is Republican. Somersworth is Democratic. Dover, the county seat, goes either way. The three cities and the rural population apparently are the closest thing you can find to a cross-section of how American voters are thinking.

For instance, in 1916 the vote for president was so close that Charles Evans Hughes, the Republican candidate, went to bed thinking he had been elected president. He woke up the next morning to learn that Woodrow Wilson had carried California and the presidency. In that election Strafford county stood: For Wilson, 4,040; for Hughes, 4,037. Went for Roosevelt.

New Hampshire normally is a Republican state. But Franklin D. Roosevelt carried Strafford county by a margin of better than three to two against both Alfred M. Landon and Wendell Willkie. In 1948, Strafford county returns were: Truman, 11,603; Dewey, 9,988.

There is a chance Strafford county may lose its reputation as a barometer because the voting rules have been changed.

Most Cities Require

Owners To Shovel Snow

Chicago —(U.P.)— Most city property owners, like their country cousins, must shovel snow or hire somebody to do it.

This was the finding of the American Public Works association in a study of snow removal in 30 large cities.

Only four cities reported that they use city equipment and personnel to clear snow from sidewalks.

These are Kansas City, Mo., Montreal, Quebec; Winnipeg, Ont., and Milwaukee. The latter will do it only if the property owner will foot the bill.

Tons of Copper 'Mined' In Heart of Chicago

Chicago —(U.P.)— A Chicago utility firm is "mining" tons of scarce copper and lead in the heart of the city.

Commonwealth Edison has crews at work ripping out underground electric cable, laid 30 to 40 years ago.

The company estimated that it recovered 2,400,000 pounds of copper and 2,500,000 pounds of lead from beneath the city's streets in 1951.

The old cable is replaced by more efficient conductors and sent to smelters as scrap.

60 Hospitalized as Stands Fall at Sonja Henie Show

Baltimore, Md. —(U.P.)— Collapsing wooden stands that bowed over Sonja Henie ice show spectators "like ten pins" put some 60 persons in hospitals, more than half with serious injuries.

The temporary bleachers gave way Thursday night before the scheduled opening performance of the ice show and hurled almost 300 spectators 15 feet to the Fifth Regiment Armory floor in a deafening roar of splintering timbers.

Stands Not Nailed Down

Paul Cohen, city building inspection engineer, said after an investigation at the scene, that the stands were of temporary construction and had not been nailed down.

Doctors and nurses in the audience administered first aid as soon as they could reach the screaming men and women,

some of whom were trapped 30 minutes under the heavy planks.

Altogether 270 persons were taken to the hospital in ambulances and private automobiles. All but 60 were released after receiving first-aid treatment and early this morning 30 more were sent home and told to report back for checkups.

Hospital authorities said the 31 seriously injured patients either had broken bones or internal injuries. Two suffered possible broken backs, including six-year-old Jean Webber.

Miss Henie, who was in her dressing room when the stands collapsed, disclaimed responsibility for the accident. She also said her show would not go on Friday unless she was assured spectators would be safe.

She said she thought the man who contracted for the stands knew what he was doing.
