

Rogue River, Bonanza 5-B Finale To Be at Grants Pass Saturday; Antler' 55-50 Win Evens Series

Klamath Falls—(Special from the Herald and News)—Bonanza evened the District 5B basketball quarrel with Rogue River last night at Henley by a 55 to 50 count, sending the third and deciding game to Grants Pass Saturday night. The winner gets a state tournament berth in Salem March 13-15.

Jim Boulter kept the Chieftains in the ball game in the first half, dumping in the first 16 points scored by Rogue River and ending the half with 20 of his team's 22 points. But Bonanza had 28 points on the scoreboard at halftime in an attack paced by Center Don Hubble.

The first quarter saw the lead change hands four times and tied three times. It was tied twice at 12-all and 14-all early in the second period until Irwin Crume gave Bonanza a 16 to 14 lead and the Antlers stayed ahead until late in the third quarter when Rogue River held a brief 37 to 35 lead on a basket by Jim Wehren.

But Vernon Haley tied the count and Crume put the Antlers ahead to stay just before the third quarter gun. The period ended with Bonanza on top, 39 to 37.

After gaining the final five-point lead the Antlers staged some classy ball control during the last minute of the ball game.

Crume ended the game with 20 points and Hubble had 16, but both took a back seat to Boulter, who collected 23. The big Rogue River center sat out half of the third and fourth quarters with four personal fouls and found just three points in the last period to add to his first-half total of 20.

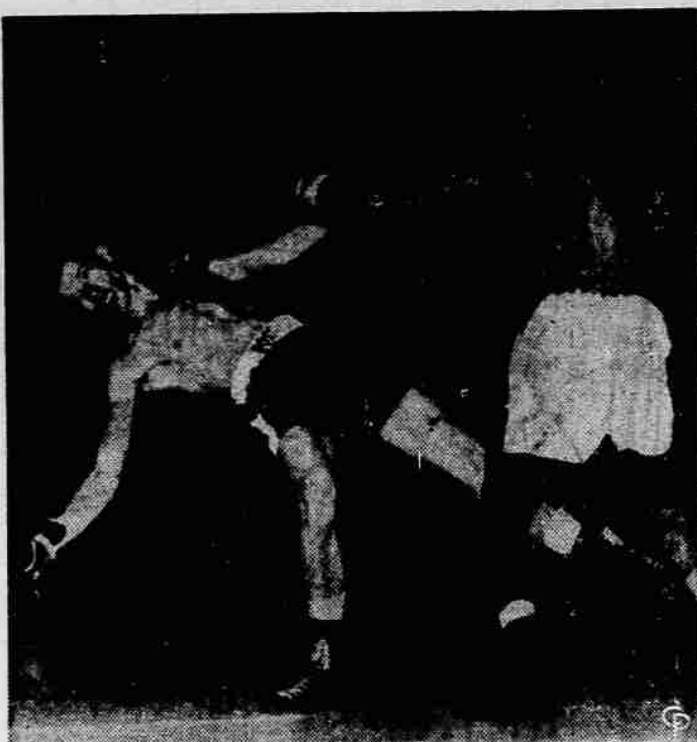
Robert Villemain Scores Knockout

Science at Work

New York — (U.P.) — Oat hulls and corn wastes have gone to work to help man in the conquest of disease.

The wastes are sources of a chemical substance that already has been found of value as a drug, an agent to combat certain infectious diseases. The drug commonly is known as furacin.

The drug, made from furfural, a by-product of oat hulls and corn wastes, was reported some years ago, but in recent months its value has been growing. A derivative of it has been found of use in treating certain diseases of poultry.

The drug was isolated and prepared by scientists of the Norwich Pharmacal Company, Norwich, N.Y., and the firm now has started expanded operations to produce the synthetic substance on a wide scale.

Production Increased
Melvin C. Eaton, president of the company, announced that a new installation will have a capacity of turning out 1,000 pounds of nitrofurazone crystals each day. That amounts to about 240,000 pounds a year, about 1,000 per cent greater than previous production.

Furacin, the drug for human use, is one of many substances made from the nitrofurans, the raw product from oat hulls and corn wastes.

Eaton reports that the Norwich scientists believe the nitrofurans "are as effective, and in many cases a great deal more effective, than those of some of the mold-type antibiotics and of the sulfa drugs in the prophylaxis or treatment of infection of wounds, severe burns, skin cancers, skin grafts and certain fungus diseases."

Furacin, for an example, is being used in Korea by the armed services medical department.

Fights Human Disease

The drug furacin having already won its laurels as an agent against human infections, the scientists are now turning their attention to find other uses of nitrofurazone. Research experiments are showing that the substance is an effective agent for the prevention and control of coccidiosis, a disease common to chickens.

"These advantages have been acknowledged time and time again during the past two years. With more than 800,000,000 broiler chickens expected to be raised in 1952, from 8 to 10 per cent ordinarily would be lost to coccidiosis through use of non-medicated feed. The grandparents discovered the boy was missing about midnight and called police. Officers hunted the streets the rest of the night.

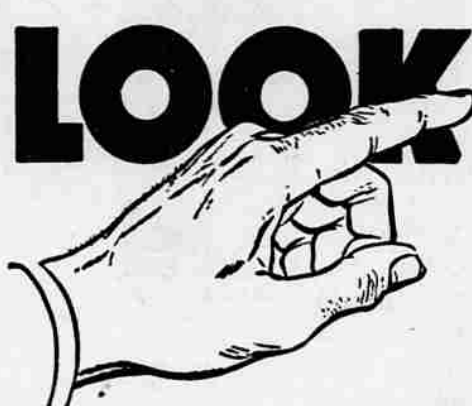
The hunt didn't end until 8 a. m. when someone got around to reading Grubaugh's report.

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
