Veterans Show Program Ready

Charlie Mack, Hollywood radio, movie and television artist, will be guest master of ceremonies for the first broadcast of the "Veterans Hour," it was announced Saturday. The program will originate from the Camp White veterans domiciliary center Friday, March 14, and will be broadcast by radio station KXJC on March 15.

Services for George Charles Huber, 79, who died Thursday will be read by a Christian Scientist Tuesday at 1 p.m. in Conger-Morris chapel. Committal will be in Siskiyou Memorial park.

Mr. Huber was born Aug. 27, 1872, in Negaunee, Mich., attending Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill. On March 22, 1898, in Big Rapids, Mich., he was married to Eva May Dyer, who died in 1941. He had been in the meat packing business all his life, coming to Medford from Los Angeles about 1933 and establishing the Huber Packing company on Table Rock road. Following a fire in 1939, the plant was rebuilt in March, 1940, and the business sold in September of that year.

He is survived by six children, Miss Donald Huber, Medford; Mrs. Meredith Watts, North Hollywood, Calif.; Glenn Huber, Central Point; W. D.
