

Investigating Committee Head Charges President "Mistaken"

Washington—(U.P.)—Chairman Clyde R. Hoey of the Senate's permanent investigating committee said Saturday President Truman was "utterly mistaken" when he charged that opponents of his plan to shake up the Internal Revenue Bureau put political patronage ahead of public service.

The North Carolina Democrat's reaction to Mr. Truman's statement was fairly calm. Some of his colleagues called the President's remark "insulting" and "intemperate."

They said Mr. Truman had hurt the chances of his program to replace the 64 politically appointed tax collectors with 25 collectors under civil service.

Mr. Truman also was rapped for ordering federal agencies not to give information to a House judiciary subcommittee investigating the Justice Department.

The President wrote Chairman Frank L. Chelf (D-Ky.) Friday that the group was taking a "dragnet approach" which would "seriously interfere" with government business.

Chelf said Mr. Truman's directive would make the subcommittee's job "more difficult," but that the group "means to accomplish our original purpose and complete this job of making an honest, fair and thorough investigation."

National Guard Units Slated for California

Sacramento—(U.P.)—Three California National Guard units pressed into federal service will be returned to inactive California duty late this summer, Maj. Gen. Earle M. Jones announced Saturday.

They are the 184th AAA operations detachment of San Francisco, now stationed in West Germany; the 250th group headquarters and headquarters battery of San Francisco, now at Fort Baker in San Francisco; and the 186th AAA operations detachment of Long Beach, also at Fort Baker.

All three have been in federal service since the fall of 1950, Jones said. They will be returned to their home armories.

Chelf said he would confer with Mr. Truman "in due time," and hoped "an amicable and satisfactory solution can be reached."

Rep. Byron G. Rogers (D-Colo.), a member of the subcommittee, said he didn't "see how the limited request would be a big burden on the government agencies."

Plan Approved

The House has approved the Internal Revenue reorganization plan which will go into effect automatically next Friday unless the Senate votes it down. A resolution to throw out the plan is scheduled to come up in the Senate Wednesday. Hoey was one of the 7 to 5 majority of the Senate Government Operations committee which voted this week to kill the plan.

California Man Held In Bayonet Killing

San Pedro—(U.P.)—Tom Green, 28, was held on a murder charge Saturday involving the death of John D. Burton, 32, with a war souvenir bayonet.

Police said Green, Burton's nephew, told them he stabbed his uncle in the heart with the bayonet after he tried to subdue Burton when he attempted to force his attentions on Green's wife, Margaret.

Medford Student Winner of Legion Speech Contest

Richard Dickenson, Medford high school senior, Saturday won the finals of the American Legion's southern Oregon district oratorical contest. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Dickenson, 333 Haven street.

Winning the event, which was held at the Medford senior high school auditorium, entitled the boy to enter the region state semi-finals. Time and place of this event had not been set.

The Josephine and Klamath champions tied for second place in the competition here Saturday. They were Kathy Phillips, of Illinois Valley high school, and Robert Chidester, of Klamath Union high school.

Also entered in the Saturday competition was Don Neibauer, Lake county champion, representing Lakeview high school.

The students gave prepared talks on "The Constitution of the United States" and spoke extemporaneously on "The Rights of the President."

Judges of the competition were Otto DeJarnett, Medford; Rev. George Bolster, Medford; H. E. Bergstrom, Lakeview; John O. Walker, Medford; Dr. Arthur Taylor, Ashland, and Walter Nunley, Medford.

Washington Strikes Back In Tidelands Oil Battle

Olympia—(U.P.)—Gov. Arthur B. Langlie Saturday struck back at the federal government for its claim to the three-mile strip of submerged oil lands along the Washington coast.

In a strongly worded letter to Secretary of the Interior Oscar Chapman, Langlie told him the federal government's effort to "grab Washington's tidelands" was in violation of the Washington state constitution.

Reply to Chapman

Langlie's letter replied to one he received from Chapman about a week ago. At that time the secretary of interior informed the Washington governor:

"Under the doctrine of the cases against California, Louisiana and Texas, the United States believes and asserts that the submerged area along the coast line of the state of Washington... is subject to the full domination and power of the United States."

Advices Against Permits

Chapman advised the state to issue no more oil and gas permits on its tidelands, which have produced favorable signs recent-

ly of commercial oil and gas quantities. Furthermore, Chapman told the state oil and gas permits already issued were to be considered null and void.

"This is the latest and most drastic expression of government by edict," Langlie said.

Fishermen File Suit For Alleged Violations

Seattle—(U.P.)—An Alaska Fishermen's union suit asking \$3,520 for alleged contract violations by John and Nicholas Bez was on file in U.S. District court here Saturday.

The AFU charges that the Bez brothers' freezer boat, Tony B, bought \$4,800 worth of fish from sources other than union gillnetters attached to the boat, which was in Bristol Bay waters.

The union also charges the Bez brothers with failing to pay the union men one-third purchase price called for in the contract, and that the men were not provided first-class transportation from and back to Seattle.

Burned Body Discovered In California 'Jungle'

Pomona, Calif. — (U.P.) — The body of a man, stabbed in the back and "burned to a crisp" today, on an open bon-fire, was found by police in a hobo jungle near the South Pacific right of way today.
