Women attending are asked to take cotton material for quilt pieces, old sheets and scissors.

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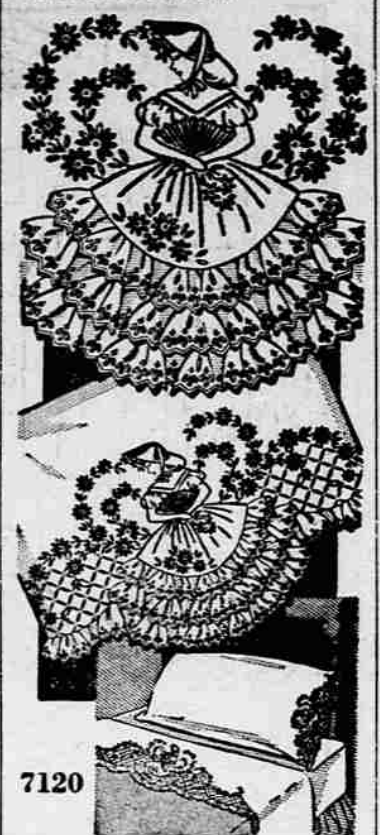
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Dr. Richard Sleeter Added to Polio Staff
