Stephen Darie Put Ashore In India by Ship's Crew

Portland—(U.P.)—A sea captain said Monday that Stephen Darie, a young stowaway who fled Communism in his native Romania and then was deported from the United States by Portland immigration officials, has been refused admittance to India.

Capt. W. J. Schade of the SS John Owen said Darie was put ashore in Calcutta from the ship which brought him here last November.

"India didn't accept him, but we made them take him," Schade said.

When Darie came to Portland he had been wandering the seas for five years—a man without a country. He attempted to gain admittance to this country, but was turned down by immigration officials.

"I don't know what's become of him. I believe India thinks it's up to the company that brought him there to ship him out," the captain added.

Darie stowed aboard the John Owen on a trip from India to Portland last year.

On his arrival in Portland, Darie said he had stowed away in Romania on a Norwegian ship in 1946, but was returned to his native country and put in prison for six months. He then stowed away a second time and became a sea wanderer.

A meeting of principals of Medford's elementary schools was scheduled this afternoon at the city school superintendent's office to discuss the relative safety of the "blacktop" asphalt concrete now in use on school playgrounds.

A large number of parents have objected to the hardtopped surfaces recently, particularly since the publication in two national magazines of suits against the school system of Los Angeles, resulting from children falling on the hard surface.

School authorities have pointed out that the black top is one solution to the problem of mud and water standing on school playgrounds, and figures have been advanced in other cities to show that accident rates have not increased since the use of the topping.
