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**'Mr. President' Book
Soon To Be Released**

Washington—(U.P.)—Ten days or so from now the nation will be talking about a book called "Mr. President," written by William Hillman and illustrated by Alfred Wagg.

This popular discussion more likely will increase than diminish, perhaps right up to convention or election time. Farrar, Straus and Young are the publishers. They have ordered an unusually large first press run of 110,000 copies to go on sale March 18.

First Simultaneous Work

On March 25 all 27 editions of Reader's Digest will reach the stands in the United States and foreign countries with a condensation of "Mr. President." The digest never before has simultaneously published a condensation in all of its English and foreign language editions. There will be talk abroad about this book as well as here at home. Reader's Digest estimates that its condensation will reach 55 million persons.

The "Mr. President" of this book is Harry S. Truman. He gave Bill Hillman the keys to his non-secret but peculiarly personal files. The result is 253 pages of illustrated text. There are 65,000 words of direct quotation, thousands of words from the President's personal diaries,

documents, letters, and notes.

Do you want to know Mr. Truman's private thoughts after writing that famous letter to a music critic who said Miss Margaret sang less than well? The publisher says they will be there.

But that is mostly blurb common, whether it is there or not. The significance of this book seems best stated in some sentences from Hillman's explanation of why and how he wrote it. He relates that he had a letter from Mr. Truman about it which said:

"I have concluded that for the historical record and a broader comprehension of the public of their 32nd President and the presidency, I should release some of them private papers for publication now. I want the people to know the presidency as I have experienced it and I want them to know me as I am."

Mr. Truman told Hillman some persons may judge the book to be a political act. That is to say, a campaign year product in behalf of a candidate. Hillman and the President state that is not so.

It could become so, of course, by force of circumstances. There is a good chance that this book will be part of a President's re-election campaign. Events will determine that.

But for sure this book is the challenge of a man who feels that many people misunderstand him, down-rate him, or, maybe, hold him in some degree of contempt. Mr. Truman has taken a direct and unusual approach toward the historical niche to which he feels he is entitled.

Ask him to continue to be friends for the sake of the past. If he is the right sort of man, he will accept your explanation in good faith and be courteous to you when you meet.

Until you can pull yourself together and get a better perspective on this whole problem, why not go away for a visit to friends and relatives, or take a temporary job in another community? Being away will help you to see things more clearly than you can see them now and it will eliminate the heartbreaking experience of seeing the man you love with someone else. Going away may also serve another purpose. If this man really loves you and broke the engagement because of hurt pride, he too may see things in a new light and follow you.

**New Method Developed
To Discover Uranium**

High-Priced Angus Sale Reported

Maj. L. L. Rafferty, of the Rogue Angus farms near Grants Pass, pointed out today that a United Press story from Spokane in Sunday's Mail Tribune gave credit to another for the largest-price sale of an Aberdeen Angus bull.

The story said that the \$3,200 paid at an auction in Spokane was the largest price, but Major Rafferty pointed out that the West Coast record for Angus bulls was established on March 3, 1952, at the Pacific Coast Aberdeen-Angus association regional show and sale in Sacramento, Calif., when two bulls

from the Rafferty ranches sold for \$4,050 and \$3,600.

Bred in Valley

Both bulls were bred at the Rafferty establishment, and fitted for sale by Major and Mrs. Rafferty. Elban Royal was purchased by Bearsto Brothers, Eugene, for the higher price, and the other, Blackcap Stamp of Rogue, by Ray Frazier, Angustale farm, Amboy, Wash.

Major Rafferty said his stock was purchased from Charles and Catherine Ryan, of Rancheria Angus, Anderson, Calif., who until recently were located near Butte Falls.
