### Vining Company Begins Rehearsal Of Spring Plays

Ashland—Intensive rehearsals began this week on the four modern plays comprising the spring season of the Vining Repertory company at Ashland's Lithia theatre. The series includes two recent Broadway comedies, "Arsenic and Old Lace" and "Cloude," Wilde's frothy "The Importance of Being Ernest," and the 1950 Pulitzer prize winner and International success, "Death of a Salesman."

Angus Bowmer, producing director, has set April 14, the Monday after Easter, as the opening night for the only professional theatrical company in the Pacific Northwest. The closing performance will be on May 10, with the four plays being presented in rotation every night of the week except Sundays.

Members of the troupe who were seen in the Vining company's fall season last November and are well known for their prominent roles in the Shakespearean festival, are Clara Margaret Daniels, Franklin Reed, Philip and Suzanne Hanson, Brad and Barbara Curtis, Richard Graham, Angus Bowmer, and H. Paul Kliss.

New to the company are Elmarie Wendel of Eugene, and Eddy Barron, Ashland, both of whom are members of the Virginia City Players of Montana. Miss Wendel attended the University of Oregon in Eugene, starring there last summer in "Mary, Queen of Scots." Mr. Barron is a graduate of the University of Washington drama department, and appeared in the Shakespearean Festival before his two years with the Montana stock company.

Preparations for the coming series were interrupted and rehearsals delayed when all the seats in the orchestra and mezzanine were removed for use in other theaters of the Lippert chain. Permission was granted, however, to use the older seats that the Lithia ones had replaced, and under the direction of Edwin R. Hoyt, Ashland businessman, reinstallation has begun. The box office of the Lithia is now open daily from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. and individual reservations and subscriptions are available.

The "girls in green," as the Girl Scouts have long been identified, have grown from the original troop of 12 girls, founded by Juliette Low, to their present 1,770,000 strong.

In this scout area, Medford is celebrating its 25th birthday. Grants Pass the 27th and Ashland the seventh year of scouting. Scouts in the Rogue River valley now number around 1550 girls and about 400 adults.

Many troops will hold Juliette Low teas and courts of awards. Phoenix will hold a birthday tea in honor of Juliette Low today at Phoenix Presbyterian church. A world friendship offering will be taken and the program will also include a court of awards.

Mrs. F. D. Shepherd's Troop No. 71 of seventh grade Phoenix scouts will give a radio program over KJYC Wednesday, March 12 at 5:45 p. m. entitled "A Party for Parents," which presentation is a requirement for the radio badge.

As part of Medford district's 25th birthday celebration, the district will hold its annual recognition meeting in the form of a potluck dinner March 20 at the high school, at which members of Troop No. 1 founded in 1927 will be honor guests. This event is given annually by the district committee to honor all adult scout workers.

Medford junior high school Parent-Teacher association will meet in room 8 of the junior high school, Thursday, March 13, at 8 p. m.

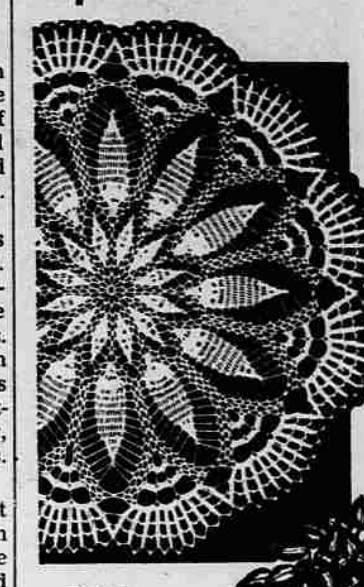

### Honor Guest

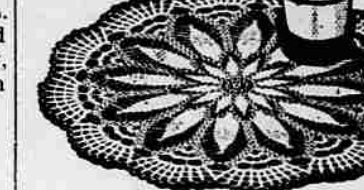
