

Farm Bureau Banquet Held Monday; 'Week' Kick-Off Conducted

Marshall Swearingen, state president of the Farm Bureau Federation, was principal speaker at the "kick-off" dinner of the local observance of Farm Bureau week here last night. The dinner was at the Medford hotel.

Swearingen told the Jackson county members that he has been a member of the bureau for 17 years for three principal reasons:

1. It is a group of farmers formulating their own policies;
2. The federation is the nation's largest farm organization, with 1 1/2 million members in 47 states and Puerto Rico, and
3. It is a federation, with no central structure of control.

Have Equal Vote

Each county has an equal vote on resolutions, he pointed out, and county and regional delegates are voting members at state conventions, and officers of the federation carry out the instructions of the members—not vice versa.

The bureau includes every type of farmer, Swearingen emphasized, and not just one group such as dairymen or cattlemen. Members in Jackson county are orchardists, dairymen, stockmen, truck farmers, dry land farmers, seed crop farmers, and others. All farmers are invited to investigate the farm bureau as a "voice" in agricultural policies on a local, state and national level.

Check-Up Meeting Set

A "check-up" meeting will be

held in the county courthouse Thursday evening to see how the current membership drive is progressing. It was announced last night. Membership teams this week are conducting an all-out drive to cover the county.

In addition to attracting members, the week is designed to better acquaint people of the county with the importance of a prosperous agricultural economy and the efforts of the Farm Bureau to improve the conditions.

T. S. Tieg, president of the county bureau, said, "We are trying to do a good job of public relations for agriculture."

Will Answer Queries

Questions about the bureau will be answered by Mrs. Martin D. Schnack, secretary of the Jackson county bureau, route 3, Medford, Tieg said.

Navy Mail Clerk Arrested in Theft Of Money Orders

Memphis, Tenn. — (U.P.) — Federal authorities jailed a 24-year-old Navy mail clerk here Monday night in the theft of \$53,000 worth of postal money orders from his ship.

The arrest of Gene Pearson Crawford ended a two-week chase by plane, train and automobile over the South and Southwest, postal authorities said.

Wife Not Implicated

Crawford was seized as he stood outside a drug store where he had left \$1,720 in a brown paper bag for his wife, who was not implicated in the theft.

The sailor had just arrived by chartered airport limousine from Little Rock, Ark.

"Gambling did it," Crawford told police after his arrest. "I just got to gambling on my ship and lost more money than I could pay back."

Money Spent on Autos

Memphis Detective Chief M. A. Hinds said Crawford had cashed about \$7,000 worth of the money orders he took from the USS Walke at San Diego, Calif. The mail clerk said he spent most of the money for the purchase of two automobiles and plane and train fare. Authorities also found two Navy pistols and two circular postal stamps in Crawford's possession. The stamps were used to validate the money orders, he said.

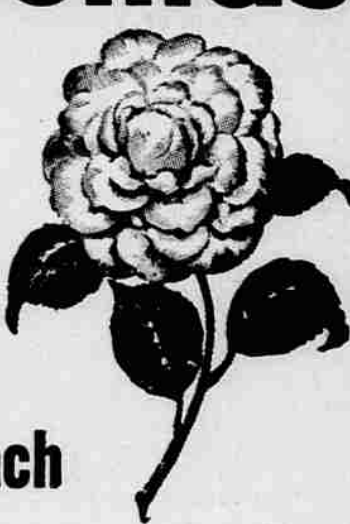

India Evangelist To Speak Tomorrow

Lee Thomas, 33-year-old evangelist who recently returned from India where he conducted a series of meetings under the sponsorship of the Youth for Christ movement, will show a documentary film about India, which he produced himself, at the Foursquare church here at 7:45 p. m. Wednesday.

Thomas, a veteran of World War II, was in India during the war, and was wounded there when an ammunition train exploded. He spent 13 months in a hospital there, and at that time decided to become a minister.

In 1951 he returned to India, and to other countries of Asia. The film which resulted is colored and sound, and the Rev. Harry J. Hansen, pastor of the Foursquare church here, said it has been termed "the most informative film on India ever presented to the American public."

Beginning Thursday, the Rev. C. T. James, Los Angeles, will hold service at the church. They will continue through Sunday. Mr. James, a Negro, conducted services here about a year ago, which were popular.

High-Altitude Jump Made by Lieutenant

With Combat Command Car go, Korea—(U.P.)—A possible record for a high-altitude paratroop landing may have been established by 1st Lt. K. S. McKinnon of the 8th Army Quartermaster section, who parachuted to a mile-high snow-covered peak near the Korean battlefield.

He leaped from a C-46 Commando of the 437th Troop Carrier Wing Monday after it had airdropped 10 tons of supplies to the 5th Air Force mountain radio station. The lieutenant wanted to study means of reclaiming supply parachutes.

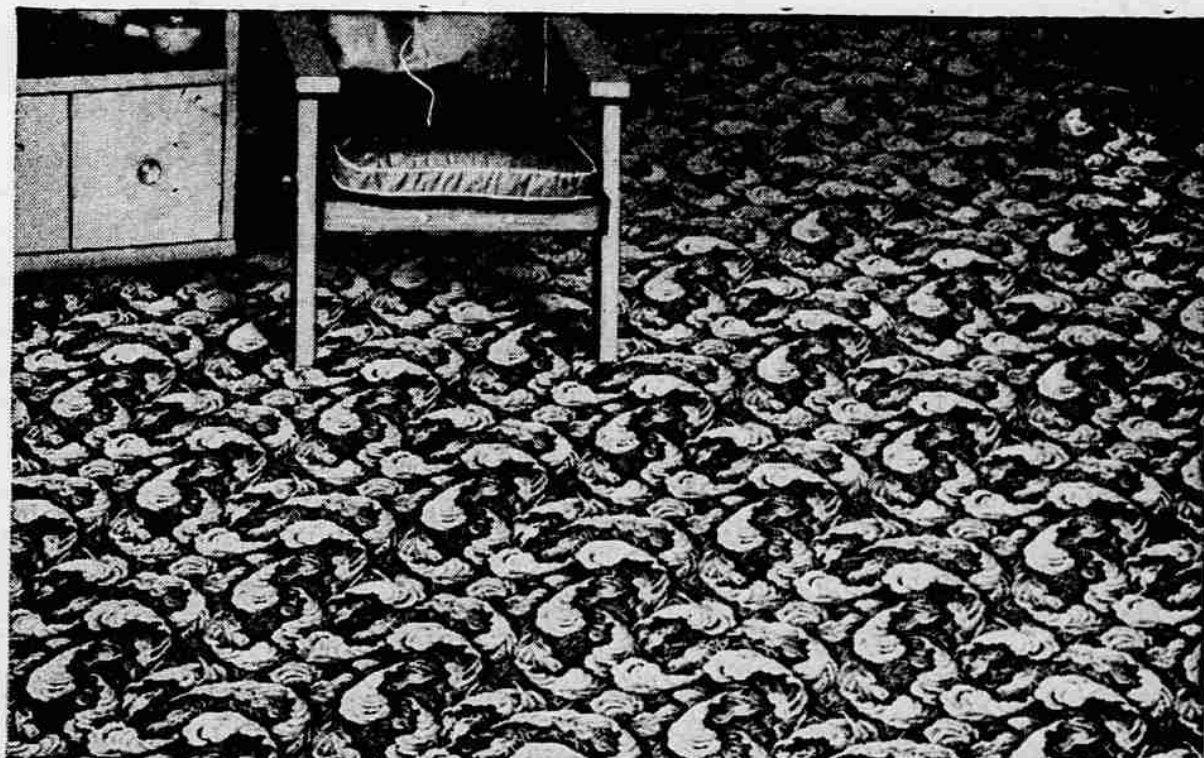
