Laborites Attack Churchill Regime On Budget Issue

London—(U.P.)—Laborites bitterly attacked the Churchill government's new budget Wednesday for turning Britain back from socialism toward free enterprise.

The Socialist press and trade union leaders loosed the first blast against the budget introduced by Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler in Commons Tuesday.

The Daily Herald, organ of the Labor Party, called it a "bad and unjust budget" because it ended the late Labor government's "fair shares for all" program in favor of incentives for increased production.

Arthur Deakin, chairman of the 8,000,000-member trades union congress, charged that any increased benefits to workers would be more than offset by price increases certain to follow a 39 per cent cut in government food subsidies.

Butler announced that the conservative government intends to cut food subsidies from \$1,148,000,000 to \$700,000,000 to reduce the taxation burden on wage-earners. This will boost bread prices two cents a loaf, meat four cents a pound and cause lesser increases in the price of butter, bacon, sugar, cheese and tea.

Tunisia Ministers Ask Lift of French Ruling

Paris—(U.P.)—Two Tunisian ministers have appealed to the French government to lift its ban on their foreign travel and permit them to visit the U.S. Minister of Justice Salah Ben Youssef and Minister of Social Affairs Mohammed Badra said they wanted to present the case for Tunisian home rule to the American public.

Klamath Indians Vote Road Building Program

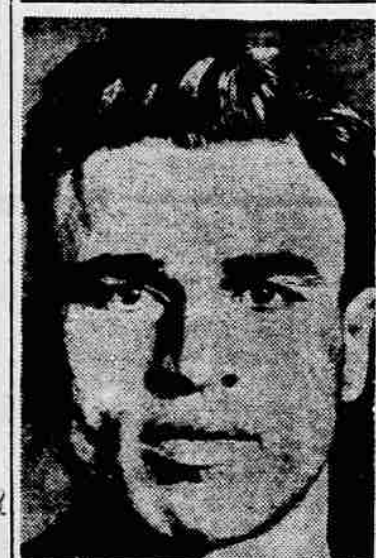
Klamath Falls, Ore.—(U.P.)—Members of the Klamath Indian tribe voted Wednesday on a long-range road construction program, which will cost an estimated \$5,462,000. The ballot was advisory in nature and no dates were set for any of the road work. Construction on 44 roads and 18 bridges is encompassed in the plan.
