Still Pied Pipers Against Field In 3rd Day of NAIB Tournament

Kansas City—(U.P.)—Hamline university and the seven teams seeded behind it moved into the third day's play Wednesday in a lineup to delight players in the 14th annual NAIB basketball tournament.

The top teams were so paired two of them were matched in a round-of-16 games in the week-long grind that holds a U. S. Olympic basketball potential for the champion.

Utah State started fast in the tournament, defeating Clarion Pa. Teachers in a first round game, 85-68.

Businesslike

The Aggies from Logan, making their first appearance in the NAIB cage marathon, turned back Clarion, also a newcomer, in business-like style. They led at halftime, 49-34.

It still appeared to be Hamline's defending champion Pied Pipers of St. Paul, Minn., against the field. The Pipers were matched against Montana State at 6 p. m. They trimmed Tampa in the first round 90 to 65.

But good as they are, the Pipers saw the show stolen from them briefly, at least, when second-seeded Eastern Illinois ran up 113 record-tying points in Tuesday's feature, a 113 to 78 victory over Huron State of South Dakota.

Portland Among Seeded

Huron fell, but not without a fight. Gene Smith scored 35 points for the losers, high for the 1952 tourney.

Hamline, Murray State, Millikin university, Portland, and Southwest Missouri are among the seeded eight who won first round games Monday.

Tuesday, Eastern Illinois, Lawrence Tech and Southwest

Texas State joined them as seeded winners.

Washburn's Ichabods of Topeka, Kan., tied a loser's NAIB record in scoring 80 points while bowing to Lawrence Tech, 97 to 80.

Private Australia Lottery Biggest From Point of Tax

Hobart, Tasmania—(U.P.)—Adams Tattersall's lottery, believed to be the world's only major privately-owned lottery, is today the biggest business, from a tax standpoint, in the Australian island state of Tasmania.

Tattersall, a name widely used in horse racing in British areas, comes from Tattersall's horse auction mart in London, founded in 1766 by Richard Tattersall.

The famed lottery, begun by a young English migrant in a Sydney pub in 1881, has in its 71 years survived wars and politics that have crushed or nationalized numerous other lotteries elsewhere in the world.

"Tatts," as the firm is affectionately known in Australia and New Zealand, employs 450 persons and pays about \$5,000,000 a year in Australian state and other government services.

Long Hours Spent As Night Watchman Credited for Song

Pittsburgh—(U.P.)—Churchill Kohlman, a Negro cleaning plant night watchman who composed one of the current hit songs, credits the long hours he has spent patrolling his lonely rounds for the inspiration.

Kohlman said he planned to continue in his job even though his song "Cry," is near the sales top. Sixteen record companies have waxed the song and one company alone has sold almost a million copies.

"All my life I've been chasing the songwriter's rainbow, but I didn't dream it would be like this," Kohlman said.

He sent more than 200 of the songs that came to him in the night to publishers without a single acceptance. In many cases the envelopes weren't even opened.

Professor Helps

Then one night as he worked as watchman at the University of Pittsburgh, he heard a professor talking to his wife on the telephone. The wife wanted advice on how to quiet her baby, who was crying.

"He told his wife to let the baby cry; it would do her good to get it out of her system," Kohlman related. Before the night was over a song urging the world to "go ahead and cry" was lilting through Kohlman's mind.

The melody sounded good to him then. Now, hearing it from radios, television sets and music boxes, Kohlman said:

"It's really music to my ears."

Can Jot Down Tunes

A native of Pittsburgh, Kohlman's only musical education was a correspondence school course in theory, but he can "chord enough on the piano to get a tune down on paper."

The songwriter is the father of three children. He is prouder of them than his hit song, Eleanor, 16, is a cheer leader and honor student at Peabody High School and Carl, 10, is getting A's at Liberty school.

Phyllis, 2, recognizes her father's song when it is played on the radio and joins in.

"I don't want to sound like a doting father, but she never misses a word," Kohlman declared.
