Hugh Herbert, 66, Veteran Screen Comedian, Dies

North Hollywood — (U.P.) — Comedian Hugh Herbert, 66, whose fidgety hands and giggling "woo woo" brought chuckles to movie and theater goers for four decades, died suddenly at his home Wednesday night of a heart attack.

The smiling little comedian with the baggy eyes succumbed shortly after 7 p. m. PST, to end a career of performing, writing and directing that included nearly a quarter of a century in vaudeville.

He was attended by his personal physician and long-time friend, Dr. Victor Kovner, who said Herbert called him a short time before he died and complained of feeling ill.

The doctor went to Herbert's home, but the comedian died soon after he arrived.

Husband, Grocery Shopping, Shot

Denver — (U.P.) — A 55-year-old husband looked up from his hospital bed Thursday and said: "from now on my wife does the grocery shopping."

The husband, Willard Geer, was shot through the neck when he interrupted a \$2,500 holdup of a grocery store.

"I've been trying to tell her for years," Geer said. "But the shooting clinched it. From now on, Mildred—my wife—does the grocery buying."

Geer was shot when he walked into a Safeway store here. When one of the four stickup men told him this is a "holdup," Geer said "I laughed and said 'oh, yeah?'"

The gunman shot him. Late Wednesday night, police captured the three men and a blonde woman who admitted the robbery and shooting.

Boy Hit by Train Receives Broken Leg

Hanna, Wyo. — (U.P.) — An 11-year-old schoolboy dashed into the path of Union Pacific's streamliner "City of Los Angeles" here—and escaped with only a broken leg.

Young Billy Duran, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Duran, ran from between sidetracked cars into the fast-moving streamliner's path Wednesday. Train Engineer Ralph Broderick heard the thud and notified officials that he believed a boy had been killed.

A search of the area failed to turn up a body—and it was later disclosed the boy walked from the scene of the accident until his leg began to hurt. His 14-year-old brother, Andy, carried him the rest of the way home.

Stockman Family On Cover of Post

Washington — (U.P.) — Rep. Lowell Stockman and members of his family have made the March 15 issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

The Post Republican was pictured on the magazine's cover sitting at the head of his dinner table in his Washington home and watching his 15-year-old daughter Margery blow out the candles on her birthday cake.

At the foot of the table is his wife, Dorcas. Next to Margery is Jay Hayden, 11, and his mother, Betty. Across the table is Betty's husband, Martin, Washington correspondent for the Detroit News and a close friend of the Stockman family. Next to him is John Hayden, 10, and grandmother.

Grandmother was the one person in the picture that artist John Falter said was not real. Artist Falter first took a picture of the scene in the Stockman home and then went home and painted the picture.

Ousted Cuba Official In Exile in Mexico

Havana, Cuba — (U.P.) — Ousted President Carlos Prío Socarras flew to exile in Mexico Thursday, leaving Gen. Fulgencio Batista, Cuba's strong man, in unchallenged control of the country.

Prío and a group of the cabinet ministers ousted with him left by plane for Mexico City, with their families.

The former president waved sadly to less than 200 persons who applauded mildly as he entered the four-motored DC-6 air liner.

Among those who accompanied Prío were Aureliano Sanchez Arango, his foreign minister, and former Interior Minister Segundo Curti.

The Dalles Dam Building Starts After Ceremony

The Dalles, Ore. — (U.P.) — The five-year job of building the \$3,500,000 The Dalles dam began Thursday following ceremonies attended by an estimated 5,000 persons.

Detonations of six tons of dynamite on the Washington shore climaxed the festivities. Unlike a previous explosion two weeks ago, no fish were killed. This blast was on dry land.

New Era Seen

Gov. Douglas McKay of Oregon said he believed completion of the dam would mark start of a new era in which industry will surpass Oregon's leading resources, timber and agriculture.

The dam, when completed, will have a capacity of 1,092,000 kilowatts—twice as much as Bonneville dam.

During construction, population of The Dalles is expected to increase by 6,000—almost double its present size.

The Dalles promptly dubbed itself: "The best dam town in the U. S."

Girdle Included In Shirt Campaign For Congressmen

Washington — (U.P.) — A shirts-for-congressmen campaign started in California has been stretched to include girdles, it was learned Wednesday.

Rep. Hubert Scudder, R-Calif., said he got a girdle in the mail with a tart but unsigned note suggesting a little more "figure control" by Congress.

The shirt campaign recently was started by a California farm bureau official named Don McColly. During a speech against high taxes he took off his shirt and said he was going to send it to his congressman to show he couldn't pay any more. He suggested his listeners do the same.

A check of California congressmen showed that about 60 shirts—and the girdle—have arrived so far.

With the girdle was a note saying:

"Since you people don't know how to control figures in Washington, why should I try to control by own figure here at home?"

Bank Assistant Faces Charge of Embezzlement

New York — (U.P.) — Fred E. Riedel, 57, assistant head of a coin department in a bank, was charged Wednesday with embezzling \$800 in quarters over an eight-year period. When arrested by FBI agents Tuesday, Riedel had 141 quarters in his pockets, representing the day's take.

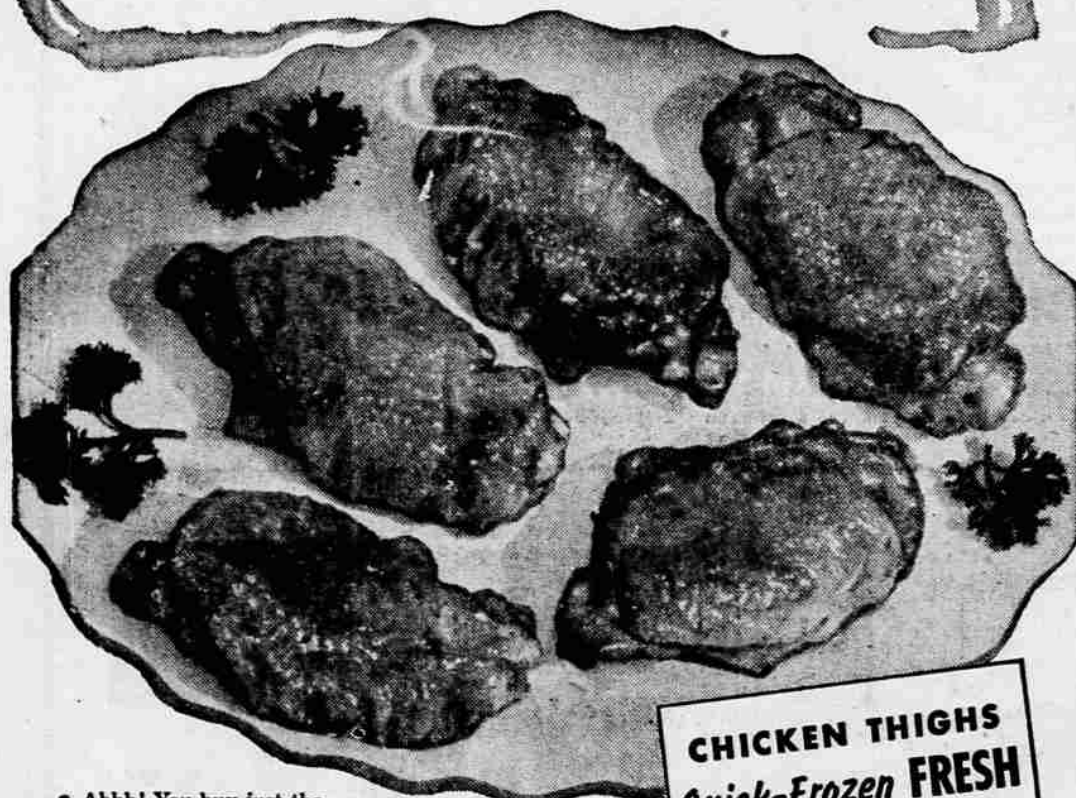
