Ashland Blood Drive Said Most Successful

Ashland—The most successful blood program ever held here was reported today by local Red Cross officials. A total of 259 pints of blood was collected here yesterday, surpassing the previous high of 212, set last month.

Officials of the program stated that 314 donors reported at the Ashland Elks temple. The Elks club, under the direction of Secretary Sid Reed, was in charge of recruitment of donors, and Mrs. H. S. Ingle was in charge of recruitment of volunteer workers.

Mystery Disease Kills Coconut in Philippines

Manila, P. I.—(U.P.)—A mysterious disease is causing \$750,000 damage annually to coconut trees in one of the Philippines' principal copra producing regions.

Known as kadang-kadang, the disease is prevalent in southern Luzon and is not known to occur in any other part of the world. A survey showed that more than 1,500,000 coconut-bearing trees are dying from the disease. Dying trees produce few or no nuts, which are the source of copra, one of the island's principal export crops.

An amphibious plant, first of its kind, is being built to mine scarce brimstone sulphur from a deposit hundreds of feet beneath Louisiana swampland.
