Civic Association To Close Season; Last Concert Friday

Gene Tobin and Attilio Baggiore, tenors, Vernon Sanders, baritone, and Bruce McKay, bass, make up the National Male Quartet which sings here Friday evening at Medford Senior High school auditorium. The concert will be the last of the 1951-52 series sponsored by Jackson County Civic Music association.

Mr. Tobin left Broadway, where he starred in "Allegro," "Finian's Rainbow" and other productions, to join the quartet this season. He made his operatic debut with the Philadelphia La Scala Opera company in 1947, and has since filled many concert, radio and television engagements.

Attilio Baggiore, a native of Italy, was "discovered" by the world-famous soprano, Luisa Tetrazzini during the time she was planning her last tour of Europe, and was her assisting artist for that season. Later he sang with the San Carlo Opera company in Naples and his American debut was with the Chicago Civic Opera company as Edgar in "Lucia de Lammermoor." Since that time, he has concertized extensively and has sung with leading symphony orchestras and on the radio.

The baritone of the company, Mr. Sanders, began his music career by singing in church choirs and in operettas while in school and later studied with Kurt Adler in San Francisco.

He made his debut singing Luther in Offenbach's "Tales of Hoffman" with the San Francisco Opera company. Recently he has been in New York, continuing his studies with Victor Fuchs.

Canadian-born McKay, the bass, came to this country as a child. He studied music at Pomona college, California, and later was soloist with the choir of the University of Southern California. He made his operatic debut with the San Francisco Opera company, singing both grand and light opera for that company.

TUNA ROLL-UPS

This delicious Lenten Dish was developed by Betty Crocker's Staff at General Mills

Preheat oven to 450°. Sift together 2 cups sifted GOLD MEDAL Flour, "3 tsp. double-action baking powder, "1 tsp. salt. Pour into a measuring cup (but don't stir together) 1/2 cup WESSON Oil, 1/2 cup milk. Then pour all at once into the flour. Stir with fork until mixture cleans side of bowl and rounds up into a ball. Smooth by kneading dough about 10 times without additional flour. Place the dough between 2 sheets waxed paper (12 in. square).

Roll out until dough reaches edges of paper. Peel off top paper. Cut dough into 9 squares. Make tuna filling: flake 1 can (1 cup) WHITE STAR Brand TUNA; mix together with 1/2 cup minced celery, 1 egg, unbeaten. Spread 2 tsp. tuna filling over each square. Roll up each square as for jelly roll.

Place roll-ups, sealed side down, on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 15 minutes in hot oven (450°). Serve with hot sauce made by bringing to a boil (over low heat, stirring constantly) one 10 1/2-oz. can condensed cream of mushroom, celery or chicken soup and 2 tsp. chopped parsley. Garnish with parsley or paprika. Serves 6 to 9.
