Products For Home On Spring Market; New Wood Stain Out

New York — (U.P.) — "Slipcovers" for flower pots and a lazy susan built on the order of a stepladder are among the new products for the home.

The "slipcovers" are the idea of Mrs. S. W. Brunner, a Flushing, N. Y. housewife, who wanted attractive jackets for the old-fashioned red clay pots.

Made of flexible vinyl plastic, the "Pot-o-Loons" are of several designs and colors to blend with almost any room setting. The covers come in three, three and one-half and four inch diameters.

The lazy susan, made of wrought iron, comes in either two or three tiers.

"The idea," said the manufacturer, Nancy China, Inc., "is to utilize the space towards the ceiling, leaving more room on the table."

China Fits In
The concern also has co-ordinated china with the server. Pieces include a bar set, coffee carafe, candy dish, fruit bowl, and bar, jam, spice and cream and sugar sets.

Two items hit the market just in time for spring redecorating. One is a new wood stain, made by Adelphi Pain and Color Works, Inc., Ozone Park, N. Y., which with one application is supposed to give a jewel colored finish to virtually any wood.

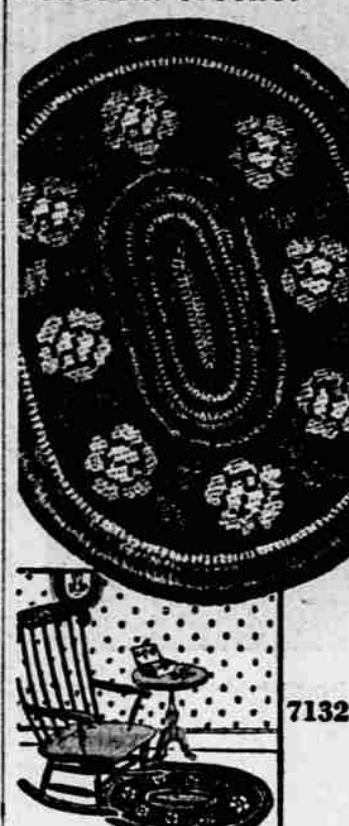
The stain, called "Color Grain," is both fadeproof and washable, the manufacturer said. It comes in eight colors — ruby red, chartreuse, green onyx, emerald green, turquoise, black onyx, sapphire blue, rose quartz, and amethyst.

One paint company, Martin-Senour, is distributing a "color visualizer" for use of the home-maker who wants to determine how colors will look once they're in the room.

Colors Visualized
The gadget consists of a folder, with a sketch of a room and major furnishings on a transparent overlay. Beneath the overlay are slots which can hold several color samples. Seen through the overlay, the samples are supposed to show the home-maker what the results will be once the room is decorated.

Refreshments will be served at the close of the meeting.



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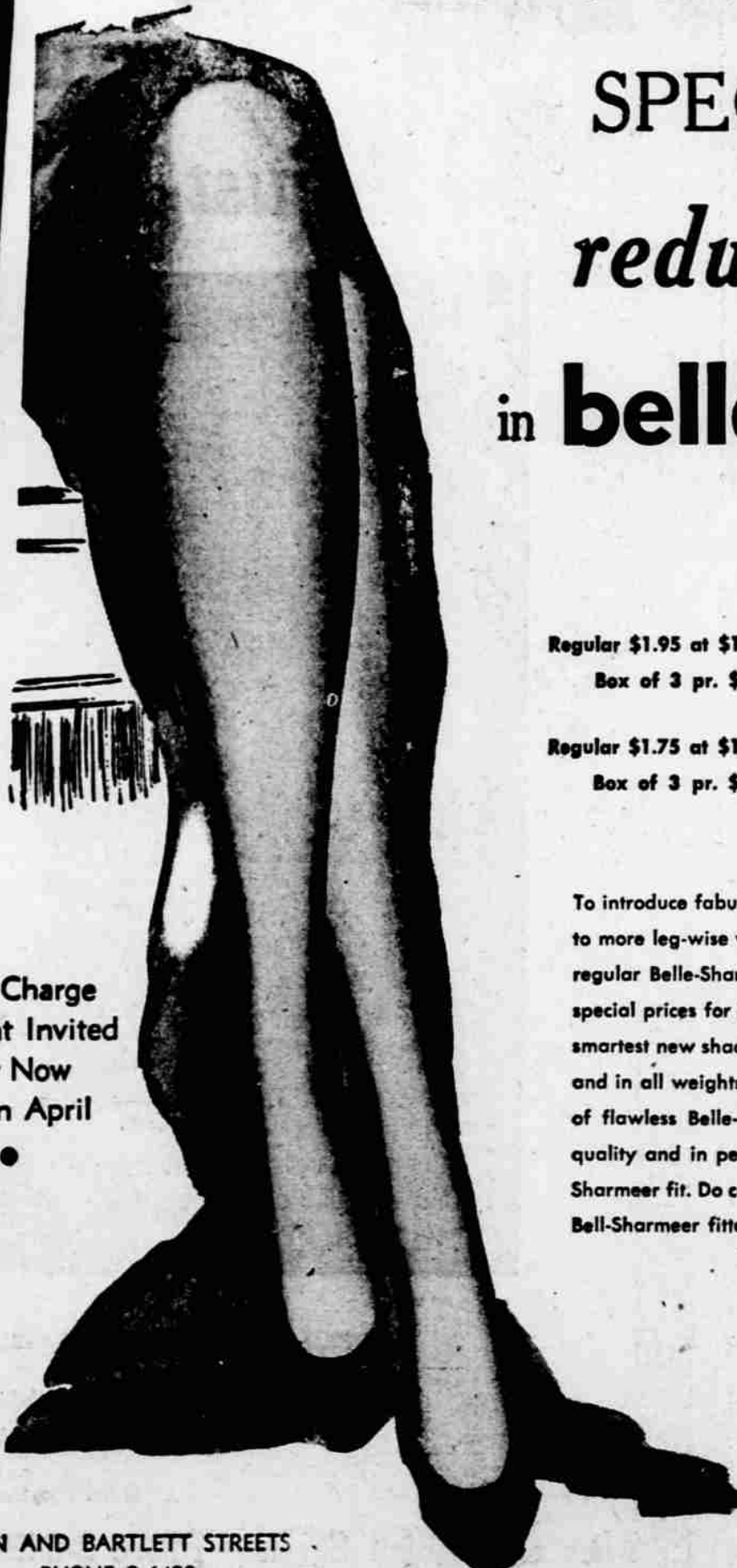
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
