Egyptologist Copies Book Off Granite Walls

Worcester, Mass. — (U.P.) — A 72-year-old Egyptologist is reading proof on a 2,000-page book he copied off granite walls 200 feet tall.

Dr. Samuel A. B. Mercer, a former professor at Trinity College in Toronto, has translated the pyramid texts for the first time in any language. The texts

represent 7,000 lines of hieroglyphics taken from the walls of 80 pyramids lining the Nile river in Egypt.

Dr. Mercer said the texts are one of the "greatest and oldest religious literatures in the world."

Glassware Glossary Aid to Homemaker In Making Selections

In selecting fine glassware for table and decorative uses, the homemaker will find in the terms used to describe American hand-made glass:

Hand-Blown Stemware—Goblets, champagne glasses, etc., that are literally "blown" into shape by breath pressure through a 4-foot pipe. Hand-blown glass is characteristically transparent, lustrous and marked with a "personality" which stamps it as handmade, as a painting bears the personality of the artist's brush in the form of brushmarks.

Hand-Pressed Glassware—Shaped in a carefully designed metal mold. Plates, heavy bowls and larger pieces, as well as some heavier stemware, are made by hand-pressing.

Crystal—Synonymous with "fine glass." Contains a high percentage of lead, which adds brilliance, strength and durability.

Cut Glass—Glassware decorated by cutting figures or patterns into the surface by pressing the glass against a revolving wheel. The artisan memorizes the pattern and cuts it free-hand with no marks on the glass to guide him mechanically.

Etched Glass—Design is made by dipping glass into an acid bath which eats into its surface to create the pattern except where the surface has been protected by a wax coating. Indentations are usually less deep than in cut glass, and the designs more intricate.

Lead Glass—Glass containing a substantial proportion of lead oxide.

Lime Glass—Glass which has a large amount of lime, usually associated with soda and silica.

Cased Glass—Plain, transparent glass, sometimes completely covered with a layer of colored glass, which can be cut through by the artisan to the level of the clear glass beneath, thus creating a 2-color effect.

Milk Glass—White colored glass made by adding some special ingredient like fluorspar or tin to the batch. It may have a mat finish or a glossy sheen, and may be decorated with hand-painted motifs.

Overlay Glass—Glass made by putting successive layers of different colored glass over a glass object and cutting away certain areas to expose the layers of color beneath.
