

New Play To End Acting Holiday For Famous Couple

New York—(U.P.)—Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne will end their year's holiday from acting this June when they start rehearsals in a new play by their old friend and co-worker, Noel Coward.

The famous acting couple, who spend their summers on their farm at Genesee Depot, Wis., have been passing this winter in New York, taking it easy most of the time and seeing the new shows.

Lunt, of course, did direct "Cosi Fan Tutte" for the Metropolitan Opera Company this season and gained wonderful notices for an outstanding production. On opening night he even appeared in the cast as a footman lighting tapers at the beginning of the opera.

The new Coward play which the Lunts will do is "Quadrille," described as a romantic comedy set in Britain and the south of France in 1875. Coward, passing through New York en route to a vacation in Jamaica, read his play to the Lunts and got their approval.

The Lunts will go to London in May to begin rehearsals for an opening in the provinces in July and a London premiere in September.

If successful, the production will be brought to the United States whenever the London run ends.

This will be the third time the Lunts have been in a Coward play. They appeared with the author in his "Design for Living" and later without him in "Point Valaine."

Coward probably will be represented here by another play before "Quadrille" arrives.

This one is "Relative Values," in which Gladys Cooper is now starring in London. John C. Wilson, who will be associated in production of "Quadrille," said Miss Cooper definitely will come to New York with "Relative Values."

Russia Communism Spreads Like Flood, Prelate Says

Singapore — (U.P.) — Russian Communism is like a flood.

Sometimes it bursts its banks and flows over the country with catastrophic violence.

Sometimes it gradually trickles through.

That observation was made by the Archbishop of York, Dr. Cyril Garbett, who toured the Federation of Malaya and Singapore for 10 days before going on to Australia.

In Malaya, the archbishop said, Communism is adopting the "trickling" method, which means gradual infiltration and a series of acts of violence. By unscrupulous propaganda, it seeks to weaken and intimidate the resistance of the people.

"If the flood breaks in here (Malaya)," Dr. Garbett warned "it would soon spread over the rest of southeast Asia." He told listeners over Radio Malaya that the people of the country were defending the cause of civilization and thus were doing a service to the rest of the world.

Asks Cooperation

The people of Great Britain and those of Malaya are together in this fight to the end, the archbishop assured his listeners. He warned, again, however, that the date of "inevitable victory" will depend largely on the wholehearted cooperation of all the nationalities within Malaya. By their refusal to give any help to the terrorists or be intimidated by them they will hasten the day of victory, he said.

Dr. Garbett paid tribute to those who are fighting the Communist campaign of murder and violence in Malaya.

Dr. Garbett said he felt sure that as those in England began to learn of their (Malayans') courage and of the dangers, Britons would feel for them the greatest sympathy.

Just One Section

"This is only one section, though a vital one, of the long front against which the aggressive Communism is throwing its forces," he said. "Korea, Indo-China, Burma and Malaya are all in the same battle lines."

The troops and police are fighting a foe who is hidden by dense jungle and can take refuge in remote mountains, Dr. Garbett observed, and he can move rapidly from place to place.

Although the enemy is not banded in any army, the arch-

bishop said, he is not isolated; he acts under directions issued from secret and well informed headquarters and he is elusive, well trained and utterly unscrupulous.

"No quick and dramatic victory is possible," Dr. Garbett said "but I go away firmly convinced that this unscrupulous foe will be defeated and outwitted."
