

Jacksonville, Talent Finalists In SOC Invitational Tournament

Ashland—Canyonville Bible Academy won the consolation title and fourth place in the Southern Oregon College Invitational basketball tournament here Saturday night by defeating McKenzie high school, 46 to 37.

Ashland—Talent and Jacksonville high schools made the Saturday finals of the Southern Oregon college invitational basketball tournament an all-Jacksonville county affair by winning semi-finals on Friday night here.

Talent, traditional powerhouse of the SOC annual invitational, romped to an easy 46 to 25 win over Oakland, leading 14 to 8, 23 to 12 and 36 to 17 at intermissions. All-Stater Rollie Hartley led the way with 19 counters. Oakland was one of the tourney favorites.

Jacksonville had a tougher time with Bandon but won out 36 to 30. The Redskins got a 12 to 9 edge in the first quarter but Bandon went into the lead 21 to 18, by halftime. In the third quarter Jacksonville pushed back in front, 29 to 26. Don Clay and Ron Craig each scored 11 for the Redskins.

Talent, which tied for third in the Jackson county circuit, rapped Valselt 52 to 43 in a Friday morning quarter-final. Jacksonville, No. 2 in Jackson county got by Mohawk 34 to 28 in the

afternoon. In the other quarter finals, Bandon tripped Elkton 36 to 34 and Oakland laced Lorane 53 to 28.

Bandon forfeited third place to Oakland, because it had played the 22-game season limit, and was handed fifth place. A Valselt-Oakland exhibition was scheduled instead of the regular Saturday night third place battle.

Canyonville Bible academy and McKenzie hopped into the Saturday consolation finale.

The Bible academy lashed Port Orford 63 to 32 Friday evening after whacking St. Mary's of Medford 44 to 23 in the morning. McKenzie waltzed over Coos River 51 to 26 in the evening after beating Prospect 76 to 22

earlier. In other Friday affairs Port Orford beat Paisley 28 to 25 and Coos River nicked Butte Falls 42 to 41.

B Tourney Semi-Final Conflict Broadcast Despite OSAA Ruling

Salem—(U.P.)—L. E. Parsons, operator at Astoria's radio station KVAS, said Saturday that he and sportscaster Wally Palmberg would attempt to broadcast the Oregon state class "B" championship basketball game between Knappa and Rogue River from the Willamette university gym.

Broadcast of the tournament games were prohibited this year by a ruling of the Oregon School Activities association, but Parsons and Palmberg managed to evade the ruling last night when they took a miniature short-wave microphone into the gym balcony and reported Knappa's 49 to 50 semi-final win over Sublimity.

"We'll be back," Parsons said Saturday. Right Assorted

Knappa is a little community in Clatsop county served by Parsons' station and he asserted its residents were entitled to hear a broadcast of their team's progress in the tourney.

Thomas A. Pigott, executive secretary of the OSAA, tore out the wire which Palmberg was using to reach a sound truck stationed outside, but Parsons restored the circuit and the broadcast continued.

Parsons was armed with a letter from his attorney threatening suit against anyone attempting to eject him from the building.

He charged that Pigott's banning of broadcasts was "arbitrary and illegal."

Pigott was reported conferring with his own attorney. Originally, he had claimed the ban was an "experiment" to determine whether broadcasts had any effect on paid attendance at the tournaments.

Plan To Select Olympic Casaba Team Announced

Chicago — (U.P.) — The U. S. Olympic basketball teams will be picked from games involving eight teams at Kansas City and New York March 29, 31 and April 1, it was announced Saturday.

Four teams will play at each center March 29 and the four winners will compete in New York on the remaining two days. At Kansas City the NCAA champion will play the NAIB winner, and the AAU runner-up will play either the third or fourth place AAU team.

The New York games will match the national invitational winner against the NCAA runner-up, and the AAU champion will play either the third or fourth place AAU team.

March 31 the college winners and AAU winners will play at New York while April 1 the survivors will play for the championship.

The 14-man Olympic team will include seven players from each of the two finalist squads.

Aegean Winner At Golden Gate

Albany, Calif. —(U.P.)— Aegean, showing a liking for a muddy track, shot from behind in the stretch Saturday to win the \$10,000 Pacific handicap at Golden Gate fields in the good time of 1:11 3/5.

Jockey Ralph Neves moved Aegean at the pace setting Reigh's Bull at the head of the stretch, and the winner, owned by Clifford Moores, Boone, Tex., moved out to score a length and 3/4 victory.

The favorite Reigh's Bull shot to the front shortly after the field of six left the starting gate, holding the top spot until Aegean made his bid.

Aegean returned \$9.90, 2.80 and \$2.30. The entry of Reigh's Bull and Special Touch, bet down to 3-5, paid \$2.10 and \$2.10. The third horse, Admiral Drake, paid \$2.50 to show.

Others in the race, watched by 13,897 fans, were War Rings and Witch-English.

\$59 Million Tax Levy In Oregon During Year

Eugene — (U.P.) — Tax levies totalling \$59,509,052 were imposed on property within the boundaries of Oregon's incorporated cities for the fiscal year 1951-52, the University of Oregon's Bureau of Municipal Research and Service reported Saturday.

The figure was determined in a recent analysis of combined property tax rates in Oregon

cities prepared by the bureau. All property tax levies within the state totalled \$105,237,270 for 1951-52. This is the first time in Oregon's history that property tax levies exceeded \$100,000,000. Of this amount, school districts levied 58.2 per cent, followed by counties with 22.3 per cent, cities with 16 per cent and special districts 3.5 per cent.

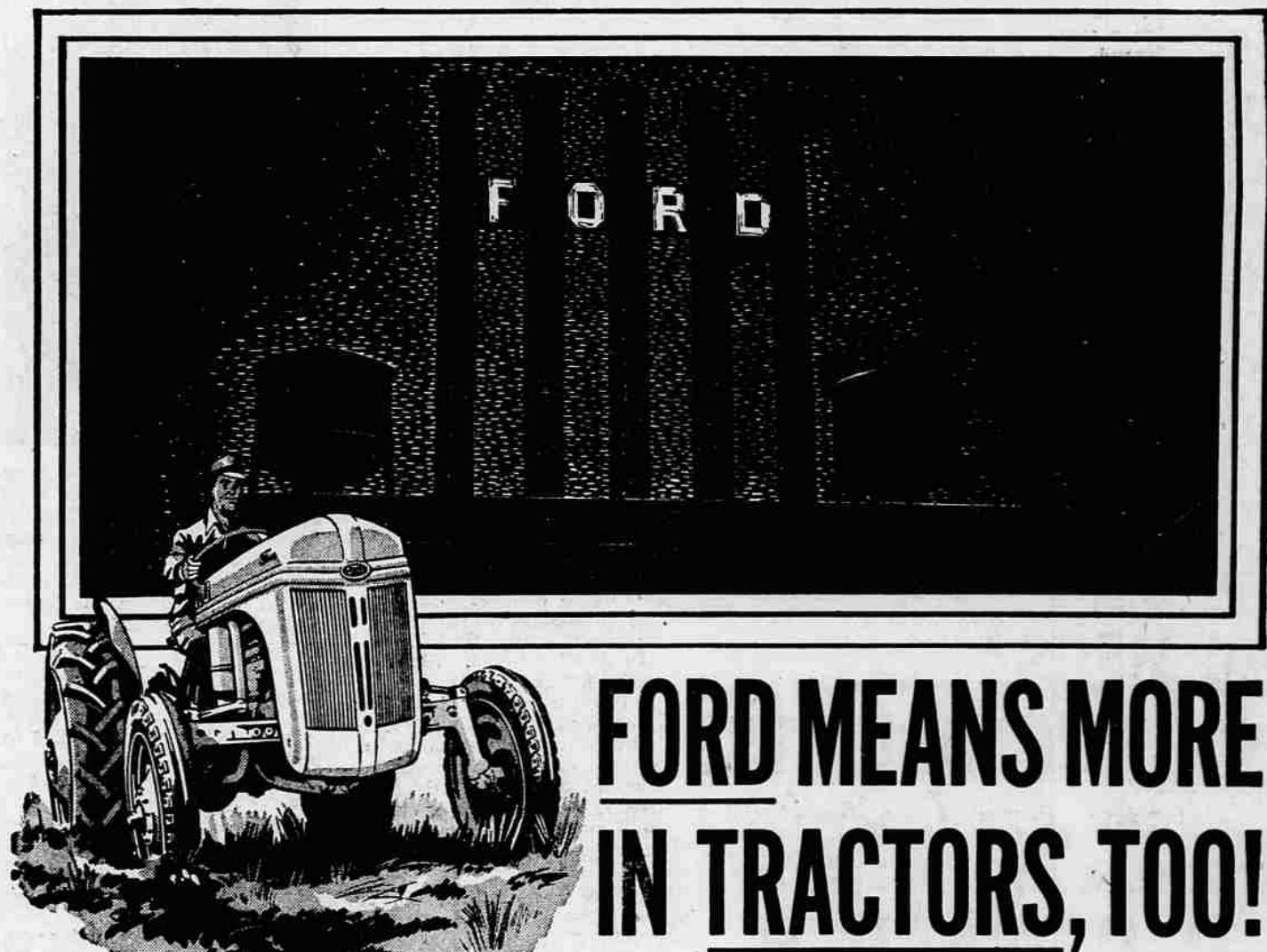

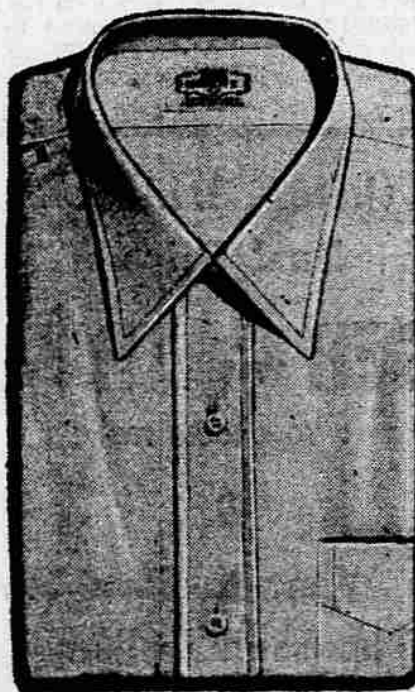
