

Three State GOP Candidates Slate Talks at Meeting

Three prominent upstate Republican candidates for state office will appear at the open meeting sponsored by Jackson County Republican Women and Jackson County Young Republicans in the Medford YMCA at 8 p.m. Thursday.

Those attending, according to Mrs. Stephen Nye, Medford, program chairman of the Republican Women, are Sigfrid B. Unander, Portland, candidate for state treasurer; Leonard I. Lindas, Oregon City, candidate for state attorney general; and E. O. Stadter, Bend, also a candidate for attorney general.

Was State Chairman
Unander was Republican state chairman of the central committee for three years and is actively seeking the treasurer's post opposing State Sen. Jack Lynch, Portland, and Fred E. Robinson, Medford, for the GOP nomination. Lynch was invited to attend the Medford meeting, Mrs. Nye said, but was unable to attend as he is campaigning in eastern and central Oregon at the present time.

Lindas is district attorney of Clackamas county and Stadter holds the same position for Deschutes county. Their opponents on the GOP ticket for the attorney general are Alex Barry and John B. McCourt, both of Portland. Both the latter two were unable to attend the candidates' night meeting.

Purpose Told
Bob Dickey, Young GOP chairman, in commenting on the coming meeting, said that the get-together was primarily aimed at informing Jackson county Republicans of state candidates from other areas. He said that people meet with local candidates but rarely get a chance to discuss the issues with those from the other areas.

Mrs. Nye added that all GOP candidates from this area have been invited to attend the meeting for the general discussion on party issues.

All Jackson county Republicans are urged to attend the meeting by Mrs. Nye and Dickey. Refreshments will be served during the meeting and informal discussion will be encouraged.

Seattle—(U.P.)—The world champion wheelbarrow pusher wondered Wednesday whether he shouldn't give up his plan to trundle to the Arctic circle and become a "radio cowboy" instead.

Larry Hightower, 51-year-old part-time horse wrangler, was flat on his back at the Seattle veterans hospital nursing a serious knee injury suffered when he slipped on an icy cattle trail on an eastern Washington ranch.

"And I wasn't pushing my wheelbarrow, either," Hightower muttered gloomily. "I know I could have made it to the Arctic circle. I got to the top of Pikes Peak and I shuffled right along through a cyclone in Michigan."

"And now, right here in my own territory, I durn near bust my leg."

Hightower became the unchallenged wheelbarrower of the world by pushing his barrow 20,205 miles through nearly every state of the union, most of the Canadian provinces and some of the Mexican states.

Spectators Arrested
