

Bend Nudges Klamath Falls In Oregon Prep Tournament

Eugene—(U.P.)—Wade "Swede" Halbrook holds the individual Oregon class A high school basketball tournament scoring record after leading his Lincoln teammates to a 70-43 victory over Salem here Wednesday.

A record-setting afternoon crowd of 7,150 was on hand to see the tall Cardinal center score 40 points on 19 field goals and a pair of free throws to top his old mark of 39 points. Halbrook shared the old record with Lloyd Guettgenbach of Hood River who got 39 points in the 1947 tourney.

Surprise Win
The Lincoln-Salem game and a surprise win by Bend over Klamath Falls were highlights of yesterday's play. Bend upset the powerful Pelicans 55-54. In other games University high dropped Corvallis 41-35, La Grande edged Milwaukie 42-40, Central Catholic beat The Dalles 75-64 and Marshfield downed Scappoose 71-61.

The consolation round opened Thursday with Astoria vs. McMinnville at 8:30 a.m.; Scappoose vs. The Dalles at 9:45 a.m.; Klamath Falls vs. Salem at 11 a.m.; and Corvallis vs. Milwaukie at 1:15 p.m.

Championship Games
In championship play, Hillsboro was to play Cleveland at 3 p.m.; Marshfield was to tangle with Central Catholic at 4:15 p.m.; Bend plays Lincoln at 7:30 p.m.; and University High meets La Grande at 8:45 p.m.

Klamath Falls rolled up a 33-27 lead at halftime over Bend, but Roger Wiley's Lava Bears rallied in the final minutes to post the 55-54 upset victory over the Pelicans. Ralph Carroll of the Pelicans was high point man with 25 and Jerry Hamilton sparked the Bend attack with 20 points.

Tidiers Control
Corvallis took a first period lead at 10-9 but Uni-High took control of the contest in the second period and led 20-16 at half-time. The Spartans were unable to close the gap in the second half. Corvallis' Ralph Harding was high point man with 16 as George Schultz aided Uni-High's win with 12 counters.

Sarasota, Fla. — (U.P.) — There were indications Thursday that Lou Boudreau, who likes to experiment, may introduce a revolutionary two-platoon system to major league baseball this season.

It all depends on how five of his outstanding rookies fare. If they can make the grade the Boston Red Sox will have a home club and a road club.

Boudreau said he "is going to have to sacrifice power for speed when we are away from home because we never have been able to win with power on the road."

Power at Home
So, if the rookies make the grade, Boudreau will play power batters at home in the hitting paradise known as Fenway park. On the road, he'll take out some of the long ball hitters and substitute players who are less dangerous at bat, but who can run and field.

Jack Cooney, first baseman for the professional Medford Rogues in 1950, goes to Portland to take his armed forces draft physical on Monday.

His baseball plans hang on the outcome of the exam. Jack, a New York Giants farm hand, was to have headed for Florida earlier this month to train with Sioux City of the Western League. He failed to get the terms he wanted from the Giants, however, and chose to remain here. He may play for the Cheney Studs semi-pro team here this summer or he still may get the financial terms he wants and continue in pro ball.

Uncle Sam's call may prevent either activity.

Cooney has been employed here by Dean Pontiac Sales and Service since ending the season with Muskogee, Okla., in the Western association last fall. Also in Medford now is Jack's brother, Jim, who was a pitcher with the Sedalia American Legion team in the 1946 Missouri state tournament.

MAY QUIT PRO BALL
Another baseballer, who may cast aside pro aspirations and play with the Studs is Clyde (Moose) Blevins. He got into pro ball last season after "previous experience with the Studs and Southern Oregon college. The big outfielder was with the Klamath Gems of the Far West league in 1951.

STUD CANDIDATES
Among those from last year's Cheney Studs club who may be on the roster this year are Clarence Melby, Alex McDonald, Derald Wootton and Paul Gehrmann. Melby, Wootton and Gehrmann are pitchers and Melby, Crater high coach, can fill in at other positions. McDonald, Medford high mentor, is a third sacker. Wootton yet has this season at Medford high to complete before any Studs activity.

CARTWRIGHT RETURNS
Another Studs prospect is Marv Cartwright, outfielder, catcher and third baseman, who just recently returned from military service. Marv played for the Medford Craters three seasons ago in the now defunct Southern Oregon league and the following year was with Dunsmuir in the Northern California circuit.

Ben Cheney of Cheney Oregon Lumber company, sponsor of the Studs, previously has indicated plans to give Medford the best semi-pro baseball he possibly can. He reportedly is after some outstanding talent. Paul (Hoosier) Hoffer again will manage the club. Workouts will start sometime next month. The team will compete in the Southwest Oregon league.

Cheney, who obtained use of the fairgrounds ball park, will put up the fence and scoreboard which were blown down in a windstorm last fall. It is planned to put a roof over the grandstand back of home plate, to clean up and paint the fence and grandstand and put top soil on the infield and sow more grass.

SPONSORS YOUNG
A group of young men, most of whom played on the 1947 Medford American Legion baseball team, have hope of forming a semi-pro nine this season and playing in the Rogue Valley league. They need sponsorship (financial help, in other words), however.

BASEBALL ABANDONED
Coquille high has abandoned plans to field a baseball team this season because it lacks a practice field. The decision to call off diamond plans came after some equipment had been purchased. Harry Brecheen's Elbow on Blink

St. Petersburg, Fla. — (U.P.) — Manager Eddie Stanky needs a pitcher to replace Harry (The Cat) Brecheen.

The 37-year-old Brecheen, the last pitcher to win three games in a world's series, has a chipped bone in his left elbow and probably will require an operation if he is to do any pitching this season. Even with the operation his chances of ever pitching in the majors again are regarded as no better than 50-50.

The chip in Brecheen's throwing arm was revealed Wednesday by X-rays. Brecheen, who has been with the Cards since 1943, has a 10-year major league record of 121 victories and 74 defeats. He beat the Red Sox three times in the 1946 world series.

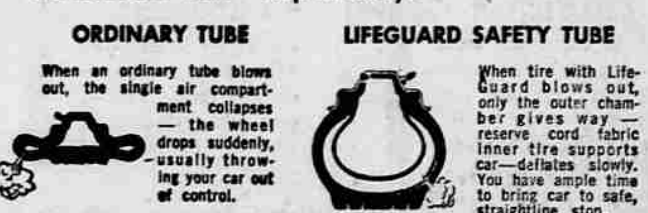
