

Points Rivalry for Retrievers Opens Friday at Hoover Lakes; Rogue Valley Group Sponsors

Black Panther, owned by Carl W. Carlson, Helena, Mont., and Rip of Holly Hill, handled by Roy Gonia, Portland, will be among the favorites in the open all-age rivalry in the points field trial to be staged at Hoover lakes this week-end by Rogue Valley Retriever club. This competition makes Medford briefly the retriever center of the coast.

The trial opens Friday and the two dogs are among the top entries of the 40 entered in the open event set for Saturday.

Black Panther out-performed 48 other retrievers last Sunday to win open all-age in the Northern California trial at Hollister.

Derby Stake First

The opening event of the three-day affair will be the derby stake set for 8 a. m. on Friday. Twenty-two entries were filed in this event. An Oregon dog won this stake at Hollister. The animal was Hal's Spiwise Zeke, owned by Harold Shidler, Klamath Falls. Zeke is entered in the trial here.

A qualifying stake with 29 entered is to follow the derby competition. The open-all age trial will start at 7 a. m. Saturday. An amateur all-age stake will conclude the activity, starting late Saturday or early Sunday. There will be a field of 19 in the final event.

The dogs will be put through a series of tests on land and in water using pheasants, pigeons and ducks. If the competition gets really tough a horse will be used to put out birds to prevent tracking in blind retrievers.

Pheasants for Sale

Retriever club members are purchasing pheasants from the state game commission for the trial. Those that are shot will be offered for sale at the grounds to the public. The fat chicks will be sold for considerably less than the club pays for them and members maintain that the price will be less than it generally costs a hunter to go out and get a bird.

Club members are welcoming the spectators to the trial free of charge and have planned much for their convenience. There will be several bonfires for warmth, tarpulins for cover and a lunch and refreshment stand.

Charles Hoover, owner of the property, is cooperating with the club in every way. He has cleared a big parking area and a tractor will be on hand to help motorists if necessary, out of any soft spots.

No Special Attire

Spectators are advised to come dressed as they please. There is no special attire required. The way to the grounds, out Crater Lake highway and Avenue A of the Camp White area, will be plainly marked.

One of the events of the three-day trial will be a Saturday banquet at the hotel. At least 150 people are expected. The dinner will be at 8 p. m. following a 7 p. m. social hour. Club members said that the public is invited. Reservations may be made at the Jackson county chamber of commerce up to noon on Saturday.

Owners and handlers of the retrievers started arriving yesterday with their truck or trailer kennels.

Millionaire Once Wanted To Chuck Financial Cares

Boston—(U.P.)—John Fox, a Boston business man who at 45 has amassed a fortune including voting control of Western Union Telegraph company, wanted to shuck his financial cares only two years ago.

The handsome Harvard graduate, somewhat of a "mystery man" in Boston financial circles, hoped to spend most of his time at his Maine summer home to "do things which I always wanted to do."

"The thing I look forward to more than anything else is freedom from pressure of any kind," he wrote in a 1949 class report.

That "freedom" he has not yet gained because today Fox is engulfed by his interests in Western Union, in which he quietly bought 165,000 shares of stock, at the time of their purchase representing a \$7,000,000 investment.

Son of a telephone company chief storekeeper, Fox started out in the investment field as a securities salesman. That was in 1929, the start of the depression.

For 19 years, during which he took a law degree at Harvard, he remained in the investment business either for himself or with a firm. In 1948, he concentrated on law, mostly of a corporate and trust nature.

Acquiring control of Western Union was just one more financial coup in a series which marked his career.

He had already gained control of the United States Leather company and played a major role in changing the company's business from production of leather to natural gas.

At one time, he came within an ace of controlling the New England Gas & Electric association in a proxy battle. He piled up most of his wealth by buying at opportune times chunks of real estate in Boston and New York. By 1949, he had disposed of most of his holdings but retained some, including 61 Broadway in New York.

Fox recently sold his home in suburban Chestnut Hill and now lives with his wife and son in Fairfield, Conn., from where he commutes to Boston and New York. Fox was a marine flyer during World War II.

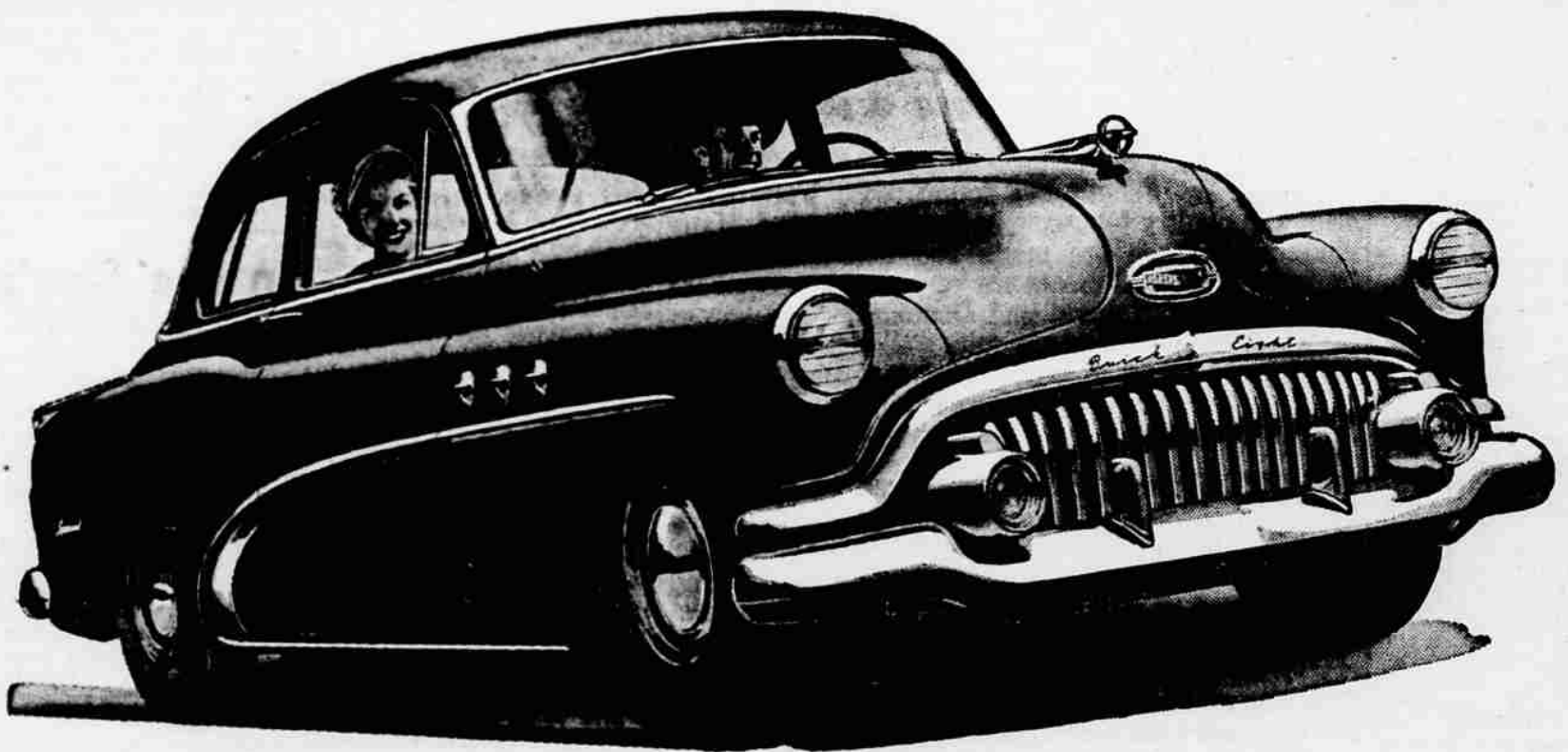
