Ellsworth Resolution Receives Support
Washington—(U.P.)—Rep. Frank T. Bow offered support Thursday of a resolution by Rep. Harris Ellsworth, R-Ore., demanding an investigation of Bureau of Indian Affairs' handling of land sales.
The Ohio Republican, who has introduced legislation designed to bring about orderly termination of federal control of Indian affairs at the earliest possible moment, said revelations by Ellsworth about Oregon sales of Indian lands showed clearly the need for an investigation.

Ashland—Mrs. Elsie McElmurry, 70, Madison, Wis., remained in a serious condition today from injuries suffered in an automobile accident on the Siskiyou Tuesday, according to her attending physician. She is in Ashland General hospital. The injured woman has not regained consciousness since the time of the accident and has a fractured skull, fractured pelvis and internal injuries, the physician said. Another woman passenger in the same car, whose name the physician did not know, also was injured and suffered a concussion, he said. She is not now hospitalized.

The accident occurred about noon Tuesday when the car in which they were riding skidded on icy pavement near Ruby's Kitchen and crashed into a bumper of a freight truck. A report from the Ashland General hospital Tuesday said Mrs. McElmurry's son, Gordon McElmurry, was driver of the car. Joseph Earl Smith was driver of the truck. Harry G. McElmurry, the injured woman's husband, also was a passenger of the car.

New Oil Pipe Line To Boise Scheduled

Salt Lake City—(U.P.)—The Salt Lake Pipe Line Co. announced Thursday that it hopes to lay a new \$8,000,000 petroleum products line from Salt Lake City to Boise this year.

The eight inch line will parallel the 330-mile products line built between the two cities two years ago and later extended northwest to Pasco, Wash.

The company president, C. E. Finney Jr., said the new unit would give the firm a daily pipe line capacity between Salt Lake City and Boise of 39,500 barrels. This, he said, could be raised to 45,000 barrels later with supplemental pumps.
