NEVER ASK A MAN WHAT HIS "INTENTIONS" ARE

When a man has been going steady with a girl for several years, she has every reason to believe that his object is matrimony. If, however, he never gets around to "popping the question," what should she do? That is the problem that is facing the young woman who wrote the following letter:

"I have been preparing myself to tell my boy friend that if he doesn't intend to marry me, we should stop going steady. I am very attached to him now. How will it be in the future and what will happen to me if he decides not to marry me? I think I'll do. Should I have a talk with him about the future?"

Under no conditions should you or any other young woman ask a man point-blank what his intentions are. In the days when your grandmother was a girl, a father felt that he had the privilege of asking such a question if the young man seemed slow

about getting around to propose to his daughter.

But times have changed. Fathers of today would not dare do what their fathers or grandfathers did for fear of scaring off the young man and of bringing down upon their heads the wrath of their daughters, their wives, and all members of the family.

Certainly that is not a question that any woman should ever contemplate asking. But by clever methods she can find out the answer to this unasked question. And that is what you have better do before you become emotionally involved with this young man more than you are now.

Have Dates With Others

Let him know that you are not his exclusive property by having dates with other men and by telling him about these dates. Don't always be ready to jump and do as he says when he bends his finger. Play the "hard-to-get" game and see if this does not jolt him out of his rut.

Portland — (U.P.) — Construction of a microwave radio relay system between Portland and Seattle was underway Thursday.
