

Teachers View Major Problems At Convention

Portland — (U.P.) — More than 4,000 Oregon educators were homeward-bound Thursday after concluding their three-day convention here with one last glance at major educational tasks and a brief peek at a problem for the future.

The final session of the 49th annual Oregon Education association convention yesterday was devoted solely to a series of discussion work shops. Prominent state civic, industrial and political leaders joined with a group of educational administrators to treat convention delegates to a down-to-earth discussion of legislation, ethics, retirement and other topics.

Important Task
Dr. Wendell L. Van Loan, superintendent of schools at Corvallis, said the important task ahead for teachers is to support reorganization of school districts which is vital in making sure state aid for schools continues. New officers installed at the meeting were Henry Tetzel, Independence, president; Vera Parrott, Hood River, vice-president, and Keith Goldhammer, Bandon; Harold Buhman, Burns, and Edward Elliott, Umatilla, trustees. Mrs. Mabel Winston, Ashland, was outgoing OEA president.

Expectant Mother Dies in Auto Crash

Everett — (U.P.) — An 18-year-old expectant mother was injured fatally and two men were hurt critically when their car rushing her to a hospital collided with a truck on snow-swept Stevens pass Wednesday night.

Mrs. Norma K. Timmins of Silverdale died shortly after being taken to Monroe general hospital. The baby was born dead.

Her husband, Donald, and her brother-in-law, Paul Timmins of Chelan, were rushed to Everett general hospital where attendants listed their condition as "extremely grave."

Highway patrolmen said the accident occurred two miles east of scenic point when the car, traveling west in a blinding snowstorm, smashed head-on with the truck driven by Donald A. McColm, Wenatchee. He escaped uninjured.

Rep. Mitchell Doubts Truman's Candidacy

Wenatchee — (U.P.) — The possibility that President Truman would seek another term in the White House was doubted Thursday by Rep. Hugh B. Mitchell because of "a number of factors I have encountered in Washington, D.C."

But the Washington Democrat told reporters here that the president's opinion on becoming a candidate has "changed several times in recent months, and he may change it again."

Mitchell had no comment on reports he would be a candidate for governor of Washington state. However, he said he hoped to have an announcement regarding this in the "near future."

Dr. Moffatt Passes In Boise Hospital

Dr. F. J. Moffatt, who practiced in Medford for about 16 years, died Wednesday night in the Veterans hospital at Boise, Idaho, according to word received by friends here. Funeral services will be held Saturday at the graveside in the Veterans Memorial cemetery at Boise. Relatives request that no flowers be sent.

Dr. Moffatt, who served in the medical corps in World War I, left Medford on May 20, 1950, for treatment in a hospital at Eugene. He later went to the hospital in Boise in order to be near his only son, W. C. Moffatt, a Boise attorney, who survives.

Portland Accident Claims Two Lives

Portland — (U.P.) — Two men were killed early Thursday when the car in which they were riding failed to negotiate a curve and crashed into a tree near Southwest Portland.

Multnomah county police identified the victims as Wayne William Strode, 38, and Henry F. Boyce, 70.

Officers said Strode's body could not be removed from the wrecked car until a tow car rolled the vehicle over from its upside down position. Boyce's body was on the ground near the wreckage. Officers said the car traveled 75 feet along the shoulder before going into the ditch, snapping off a guywire pole and continuing until it struck the tree.

Industry Warned On Freight Rates

Seattle — (U.P.) — A new Interstate Commerce commission rate structure may affect favorable railroad freight rates enjoyed by many industries and commercial operations in the Pacific Northwest, shippers were warned here Thursday.

H. C. Barron of Chicago, counsel for the Western Traffic association, voiced the warning to a Wednesday meeting of State Regulatory commission members from Washington, Oregon, Montana, and California. Representatives of all transcontinental railroads also attended.

The application of the ICC mileage—rate schedules to the Northwest would cost the railroads \$44,000,000 a year and they would "have to make this up somewhere," Barron said.

Voter Pamphlet Space Tops Record in State

Salem — (U.P.) — Candidates running for various offices in Oregon's May primary have paid \$11,730 for space in the Oregon voters' pamphlet, David O'Hara, head of the State Election bureau, said Thursday.

O'Hara said this was the largest sum yet paid for such space. Two years ago candidates paid \$6,115 for space in the pamphlet and four years ago, \$8,235.

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Recipe for SPAGHETTI 'n ANCHOVY SAUCE

8-oz. Mission Long Spaghetti
1 large onion, chopped
2 tbs. chopped parsley
8 anchovies, chopped

4 tbs. butter
1 cup white wine
1 cup chicken consommé
Pepper
1/2 cup grated cheese

Cook spaghetti in rapidly boiling salted water for 8 minutes. Drain. Put onion, parsley, anchovies in skillet with butter, fry for 5 minutes. To this add the cooked spaghetti, and over it pour the wine and consommé. Season with pepper, simmer for 15 minutes. Mix well, put on hot platter and sprinkle with grated cheese, serve at once. Serves four.
