Name New Officers For Gold Hill PTA; Bond Election Set

Gold Hill—Mrs. A. L. Harrison was elected president of Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association at a meeting Thursday night in the school cafeteria. She succeeds Mrs. Melford M. Hood. Elected to serve with Mrs. Harrison were Mrs. Carl Mays, vice president; Mrs. George Turner, secretary; and Mrs. Marie Brannock, treasurer. Officers will be installed at the May meeting.

Mrs. Harrison was also elected delegate to the state PTA convention to be held at Pendleton April 7, 8 and 9. Mrs. Mays was elected alternate.

Principal Robert Sage, legislative chairman of the PTA, announced that a bond election in the amount of \$195,000 would be held by this school district April 5, to raise money to build two new classrooms and a shop at Crater high school, and to increase the size of the Central Point junior high school. He said polling places at Gold Hill and the Central Point schools would be open from 2 p. m. to 8 p. m.

He also said that the referendum sponsored by the State Grange would be on the November general election ballot—a bill to put into effect the recommendations of the Holy report, to consolidate small school districts into larger ones.

Mr. Sage stated that comparative statistics for 1949 and 1950 showed that the cost per pupil per year in schools of less than 50 students was more than \$1,000, and in larger schools less than one third as much.

Mrs. A. L. Harrison, ways and means chairman, reported only \$12 realized from the skating party sponsored by the PTA last Wednesday night, as so many were ill.

It was tentatively planned to sponsor a volleyball game between the Gold Hill Slimsters team and a team made up of business men of the town. Appointed as a committee to make arrangements for the game were Mrs. Paul Molloy, Mrs. George Turner and Mrs. Edward Knapp.

Mrs. Knapp, Gold Hill chairman for the Easter Seal sale, announced that the drive started March 13 and would end on Easter Sunday. She said that coin-containers would be put in all school classrooms, and that children making donations would be given decals for decorating Easter eggs.

Mrs. Hood announced that the "books for Mexico" project of the PTA unit had been completed and that the books had been received by her and mailed to Mexico during the past week. She also announced that a film, "The Big Idea," a prize winning production comparing life in America with life behind the "iron curtain," would be shown Thursday, March 27, at 2 p. m. in the school gymnasium.
