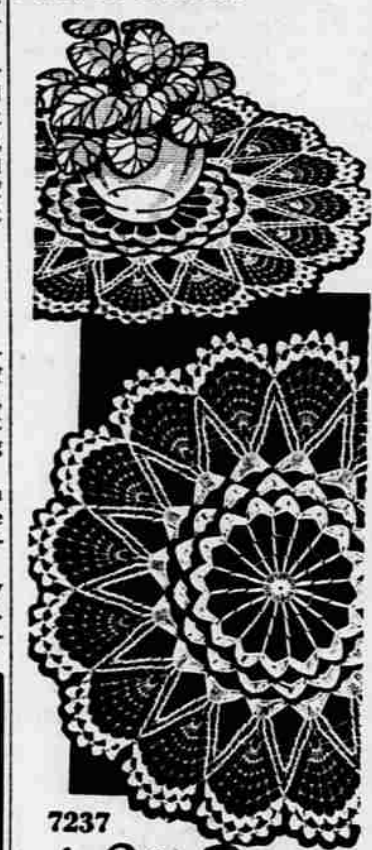
Reorganized Men's Chorus Meeting
