Toledo, Ore. —(U.P.)— Toledo voters have approved a \$126,000 bond issue for a new sewage disposal plant that would end pollution of Yaquina bay on the Oregon coast.

Toledo had been told by the State Sanitary Authority to stop dumping sewage into the bay where it is damaging commercial oyster plantings.

In the Day's News

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Accused Woman Awarded Estate

Portland — (U.P.) — An estate valued at more than \$7,000 has been awarded in Portland to Mrs. Jada Z. Kader, who is charged with the murder of her three-year-old daughter.

The windfall came to light Friday when Circuit Court Judge Ashley C. Dickson admitted a will of Mrs. Kader's grandmother to probate.

Mrs. Olive E. Shurly, 71-year-old grandmother of the accused woman, died last December. Her will left nearly her entire estate to Mrs. Kader.

An indictment charging first-degree murder faces the 21-year-old mother and a demurrer to the charge was argued before Circuit Judge MacCormack Snow this week. A decision on the arguments still has not been reached.

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Republican Chairman Plans No Resignation

Seattle — (U.P.) — Walter Williams let it be known Saturday that he has no intention of resigning as chairman of the State Republican Central Committee because he has accepted a post with the Eisenhower-for-President campaign.

"It is perfectly clear in my mind that I can handle both jobs," the Seattle financier said. "I made it plain to the Eisenhower people that I have responsibilities in Washington state and that I intend to fulfill them."

The time that I will give to Eisenhower will be taken from the time that I would have spent on my personal business. My own private affairs will have to suffer."
