This is a compromise amendment, according to league members, who state it is based on major fractions as provided for by the constitution, rather than other proposed amendments previously brought before the population.

The wedding was attended by close friends and relatives.

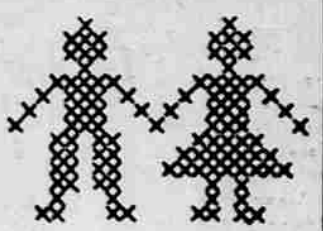
