The repertoire of plays includes "Arsenic and Old Lace," "The Death of a Salesman," "Claudia," and "The Importance of Being Earnest."

"Arsenic" is described as one of the fastest and zaniest comedies of the American stage. Written by Joseph Kesselring, this farce of wholesale manslaughter and merriment, has been selected as the opening attraction. First produced in 1941 it evoked unanimous critical acclaim. It tells the story of Abby and Martha Brewster, two old ladies who take their benevolent work so seriously that they launch into wholesale homicide. It all began when an old gentleman who came to look for a furnished room at their home died while they were showing it to him. He appeared so peaceful in death that the Brewster sisters decided it would be very nice if, in addition to their other good deeds, they could bring peace and happiness to other homeless old men.

Through Mortimer, their nephew, a New York dramatic critic, who unwittingly uncovers his aunt's secret profession, a series of incidents and situations take place which send the audiences into screaming laughter and shivering excitement. Others in the play are Brother Teddy who thinks he is really Theodore Roosevelt; and Brother Jonathan, who insists he isn't really Boris Karloff. Dr. Einstein is a curious individual who specializes in making criminals unrecognizable to the police.

Defense Agency Supports Training In Home Nursing

Jackson County Civilian Defense agency heartily supports the Red Cross home nursing program it was stated yesterday by Col. Charles Stafford, civilian defense director. The colonel pointed out that a knowledge of home nursing skills would be imperative in time of national disaster and that the Red Cross has been asked to train hundreds of persons in each local ity.

The director made available \$100 for the purchase of nursing supplies and equipment needed for the courses, he further stated. Classes are under way and are being organized at this time, and a meeting of the Red Cross home nursing committee and instructors is set for today at 8 p. m. in the home of Mrs. S. C. Watkins, 1523 Terrace drive.

The committee urges enrollment in a class meeting in the city hall Monday evening at 7:15 p. m. Jackson county has an obligation to train between 500 and 600 people as part of the nation-wide program, it was said. Multnomah county has a goal of 10,000, and large numbers are being trained in Lane and Marion counties. In Eugene and Salem many husbands and wives are taking the courses together.

"There is a great need for everyone in the community to have a knowledge of home nursing," the statement of the committee continues.

"One never knows when disaster will strike in your neighborhood or in your own home. The American Red Cross provides this instruction through free classes conducted by qualified instructors who are authorized by the local chapter.

"The new revised home nursing program is one of the most glamorous services the Red Cross offers. Every member of the family from high school age to the grandparents can take part. It is so much fun when you can learn together the skills and convenient ways of taking care of those in your family or helping a neighbor who probably doesn't need hospitalization, but just someone to drop in and inquire. 'Is there something I can do for you,' and really mean it.

"One thing to remember always is that instructions given to one, other than emergency first aid, are ordered by a physician and that the general nursing care is under a doctor's supervision or that of a registered nurse.

"Who would ever think of home nursing in the marriage vows? But it is there. 'In sickness and in health.' Happiness really depends on the well-being and health of each partner and the family to come. Fathers taking this course are winning special places in their families' affection, as the children, when because of illness must stay in bed, think it so wonderful when father can make them comfortable, and become such a whiz at nursing."
