

Union Defendant In Damage Suit

Yakima—(U.P.)—Mr. and Mrs. William E. Hembree and Maurice Turnbull have filed suit in Superior Court for damages totaling \$260,120.83 against Local 760 of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Stablemen and Helpers of America.

The suit was the outgrowth of a traffic collision between an automobile driven by Hembree and one operated by Lowell Hurst, a business agent of the union, January 3. Hurst was killed in the accident.

Damages were asked by the plaintiffs for injuries received, medical and hospital expenses and loss of future earnings as a result of the injuries.

The suit asked judgments totaling \$260,120.83 for Mr. and Mrs. Hembree and \$25,069 for Turnbull, a passenger in the Hembree car.

The plaintiffs alleged that the crash was caused by the negligent driving of Hurst.

Japanese Scientist Given Cancer Grant

San Francisco—(U.P.)—A prominent Japanese scientist doing cancer research at the University of California at Los Angeles has been awarded a \$3,600 grant, the California Division of the American Cancer Society announced Saturday.

The society said Dr. Ryojun Kinoshita has uncovered several phenomena on the nature, cause and control of experimental animal cancers. He has also effected a successful chemical treatment of a cancer in rats, the society disclosed.

School Superintendent Resigns in Vancouver

Vancouver, Wash.—(U.P.)—The Vancouver school district Saturday sought a successor to Dr. Paul F. Gaiser, superintendent of Vancouver schools for the past 18 years, who announced his resignation Friday.

Dr. Gaiser also serves as president of Clark Junior college in Vancouver and will devote full time to that position after his resignation from the superintendent's job becomes effective at the end of August.

Dr. Gaiser, who is a native of Portland, has headed the college since 1945.

New Mayor's Campaign Expenses Were \$54,000

Seattle—(U.P.)—Mayor-elect Allan Pomeroy spent \$54,000 in his pre-election campaigns, according to affidavits filed with the city comptroller.

Mayor William F. Devin said his total expenses for the primary and final campaigns were \$44,000.

Pomeroy said his campaign contributions totaled \$31,000. The election winner took the formal oath of office in the city hall Friday, but he will not take over his municipal duties until June 2.

Seattle Living Costs Advance Last Quarter

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Retail prices of goods and services purchased by moderate income families in Seattle rose .4 per cent over the November-February quarter, according to the U. S. Department of Labor's bureau of labor statistics.

At 1953, the consumers' price index for Seattle was at an all-time high, 3.7 per cent above February a year ago, and 12 per cent above the May, 1950, level. The increase, due to higher prices for rent and miscellaneous goods and services, more than offset declines in the prices of apparel and house furnishings.

Large Tunnel To Feed Water Into Ontario

Niagara Falls, Ont.—(U.P.)—A tunnel large enough to "swallow" a four-story building, stretching for more than five miles, will be built to feed water into Ontario Hydro's new generating plant at Queenston, Ont.

The \$182,000,000 power project, expected to stretch over the next four years, is one of the largest engineering jobs in the world today. When completed, the new underground waterway will be the largest of its kind anywhere.

The development involves, besides construction of the long pressure tunnel, the building of an open-cut canal about two and one-half miles long and the erection of a generating station with seven 100,000-horsepower units giving a total output of 525,000 kilowatts.

It was made possible last year when the United States and Canada signed a 50-year treaty. After sufficient water has been provided to assure the scenic character of the majestic falls, the two countries share the remainder.

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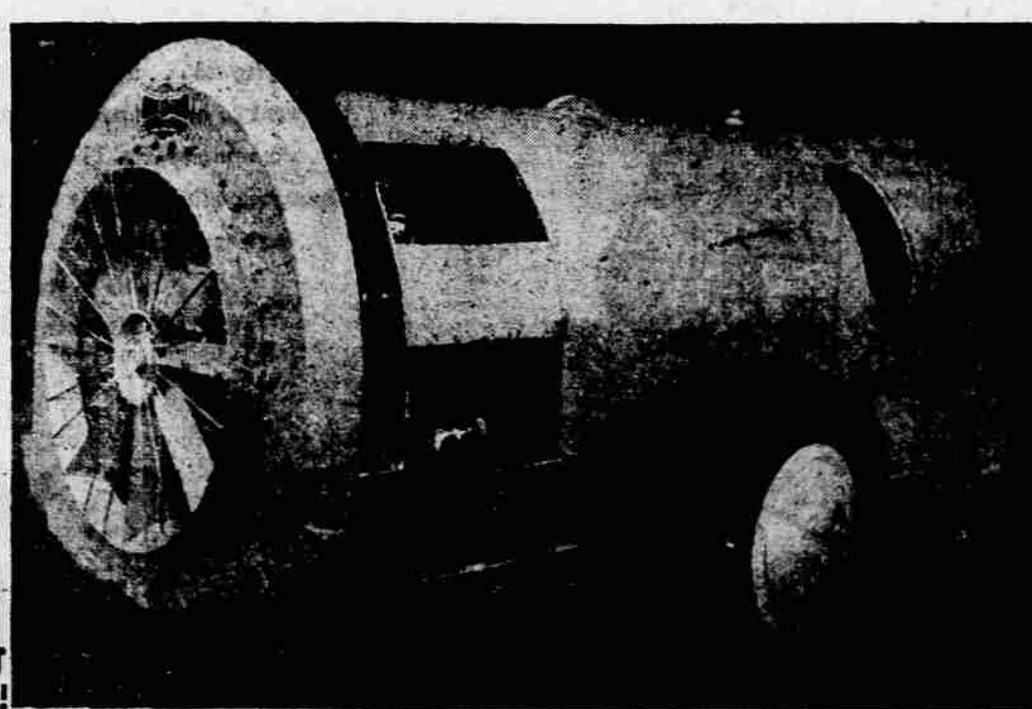


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
