Medford Woman Named Historian Of Oregon DAR

Mrs. D. O. Hood, 29 Windstar avenue, was elected state historian of the Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution, at a state convention of the group held in Portland last week. A number of delegates from this county attended, including Mrs. Boone G. Harding, an honorary member and state past regent. This was the organization's 38th annual state session.

One of the main issues of business was a vote of opposition by the group to the ratification by the United States senate of the Japanese peace treaty "as long as it contains the covenant on human rights" which the DAR and some other groups dislike.

The vote was taken on recommendation of Mrs. F. B. Epton, Portland, their national defense chairman and word of the opposition was wired immediately to the senate's foreign relations committee and to the two senators of Oregon. They objected to the covenant in the resolution because "it is contrary to our bill of rights."

The group voted to continue a \$1 per capita contribution toward the Champoo Memorial building fund for eventual construction of a caretakers' cottage near their pioneer mother's memorial cabin. They also voted to ask financial aid from the 1953 legislature to help build the cottage, and to try to obtain an appropriation from the state highway commission park allotment funds.

The action reaffirmed the position taken at the 1951 conference that adequate protection for the collection of historical material housed in the memorial cabin is a state as well as a DAR responsibility. For lack of a caretaker the memorial cabin, which attracts about 3,000 visitors from many states annually, is now open only on Sundays and holidays. It is tended by the DAR members themselves.

Other business approved a new set of rules for operation of their student loan fund, which has not been used by students, probably because the present rules are outdated and cumbersome.
