

Halbrook Leads Card Quint To State Cage Championship

Eugene —(U.P.)— Lincoln high of Portland, which won its first state tournament in the event's first year, 1919, held its second title Monday thanks to its automatic point-getting machine, seven-foot Swede Halbrook.

Halbrook scored 51 points, seven more than the entire Central Catholic team, as Lincoln rolled to a 66-44 victory before 7,856 fans in Saturday night's finals. It was the third time during the tournament that Halbrook set a one-game individual scoring record.

The Lincoln captain also scored a record 166 points during the four-game event and ran his season's total to 1,035 in 27 games. Lincoln's tourney total of 257 was also a new record.

Height Too Much
Central, rattled by many the finest all-around team in the tournament, simply couldn't match Halbrook's height. It was 36-19 Lincoln at halftime and almost a matter of how many points the Cards would run up after that.

Cleveland of Portland downed La Grande's scrappy five, 67-53, for third place. Marshfield took fourth by whipping University high, 67-44, and Salem beat its old tournament rival, Astoria, 58-37 for fifth place.

Portland dominated four of the all-state team, getting four of the first five berths. Named were Halbrook, Central Catholic's Bob Altenhofen and John Foster, Jerry Ross of Cleveland and Morris Buckwalter of La Grande.

Third Time
For Altenhofen it was the third year in a row on the all-state five, something accomplished by only two other men in history—Ted Sarpola of Astoria and Glen Sanford of Salem.

Second team all-stars were Tom Crabtree, Marshfield, Paul Bartholome, Central Catholic; Jerry Zimmerman, Milwaukie; George Hinkhouse, Scappoose; and Bob Hazel, Salem.

A new attendance record also was set with 61,882 fans attending the five-day event.

Beavers Defeat Padre Nine 5-3

Ontario, Calif. —(U.P.)— The Portland Beavers slammed out a 5 to 3 win for their third straight victory over the San Diego Padres, who had gone 26 innings without scoring a run on Beaver pitching.

Olympic Tryout Spots At Stake on Tuesday; Broncos Trip Cowboys

Seattle, Wash. —(U.P.)— Olympic tryout berths will be at stake in both ends of the doubleheader here Tuesday night when surprising St. John's and Santa Clara clash with powerful Illinois and Kansas in the semi-finals of the NCAA basketball tournament.

The way it shaped up now, Illinois would be favored over St. John's for the Eastern NCAA title and record-breaking Kansas over Santa Clara for the Western crown.

But you won't find many coaches or experts among those gathered here who are willing to make any predictions, in view of what happened to the form sheet in the final round of regional play on Saturday night.

Upset of Year
Certainly, no one expected St. John's to oust defending champion Kentucky, the nation's No. 1 team, by 64-57 at Raleigh, N.C. That ranks as the "upset of the year" in the court sport.

But it was only a little more surprising than Santa Clara's 56-53 decision over Wyoming at Corvallis, Ore. The other two regional finals followed the form as Illinois ousted Duquesne, 74-68, at Chicago and Kansas ripped St. Louis, 74-55, at Kansas City.

Coach Frank McGuire of St. John's was receiving warm praise from his fellow coaches today for the clever "slow down" strategy he devised to turn the tables on Kentucky, which had beaten his team by 81-40 during the regular season.

Possession of Ball
McGuire explained that the first time the Redmen had tried to "run with Kentucky," but it didn't work, so this time they played "possession—waiting for the 'sure shots' and driving past them." The result was that center Bob Zeke Zawoluk clicked for 32 points, one more than the old tournament record.

That Zawoluk performance stood as a new record—for about 30 minutes until six-foot nine-inch Clyde Lovelette tallied 44 points for Kansas.

The St. John's scouts must have had plenty to tell McGuire about five-foot 10-inch Jim Bredar, the Illini sparkplug, who tallied 14 of his 16 points in the second half to break Duquesne's back.

Heavy Choice
Kansas and record-breaker

Lovelette loomed a heavy choice against Santa Clara for the other semi-final tomorrow night. Even coach Bob Feerick of Santa Clara admitted that he would be "amazed" if his team should win.

But then, the Broncos have astounded the experts twice already by upsetting first UCLA and then Wyoming. Feerick pointed out gloomily that the burden of the work against Wyoming was borne by three freshmen and two sophomores, and he called the win by such a green group "unbelievable."

Tuesday's games will complete the field for the Olympic tryouts.

The other six places already have been occupied by La Salle, winner of the National Invitation Tournament; Springfield State Teachers college of Missouri, winner of the NAIB tournament; and the top four teams in the AAU tournament—The Peoria, Ill., Caterpillars; The Phillips Oilers, Air Force All-Stars and the Fibber McGees.

Play in the Olympic tryouts starts Saturday in New York and Kansas City.

Seattle —(U.P.)— Coach Bob Feerick and his skinny-legged wonderboys from the University of Santa Clara invade Seattle Monday to try to repeat their glitzy Kansas Jayhawkers Tuesday in the NCAA basketball finals.

They call them the wonderboys for more reasons than one. The coach and the whole Santa Clara team—to say nothing of 14,500 spectators—are still wondering how they happen to knock out UCLA and Wyoming last Friday and Saturday in Corvallis.

The boys from the little independent Jesuit school in northern California were given little or no chance to whip UCLA's Pacific Coast conference champs. They confounded the experts by winning by a comfortable 68-59 edge.

They were given less chance Saturday night when they went up against the veteran Wyoming Cowboys, the Skyline champs. But when the final score was in it was Santa Clara, 56 to 53.

NY Commission Has Twenty on Hoodlum Listing

New York —(U.P.)— More than 20 managers and seconds are on the New York State Boxing commission's hoodlum "kick-out" list, an employee disclosed Tuesday, as the commission

ed its headquarters from down near the Bowery up to "heart" of Manhattan.

Meanwhile New York Chairman Bob Christenberry was signing in Chicago a working agreement with the Illinois Athletic commission that should help his drive to clean up the sport.

The "kick-out" list contains the names of managers and seconds who are suspected of being hoodlums or having hoodlum connections. None of them now has a license to manage or second a fighter in New York state. However, their licenses have merely expired, and they have not applied for renewal—as yet.

On the record-card of each of the "more than 20" suspects in the commission files in this notation: "Do not renew without a special hearing."

The employee did not reveal any names on the list, but he did say, "It includes some of the most prominent managers." It is the commission's policy not to disclose the names of objectionables unless they do apply for renewals of licenses.

51 Qualify For Handicap Golf Tourney

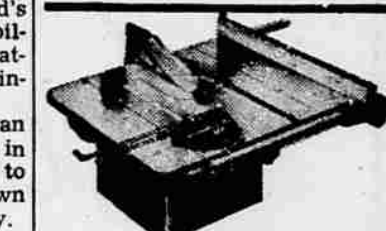
Qualifying play in the men's spring golf handicap at Rogue Valley Country club wound up yesterday and first round matches are to be completed by next Sunday.

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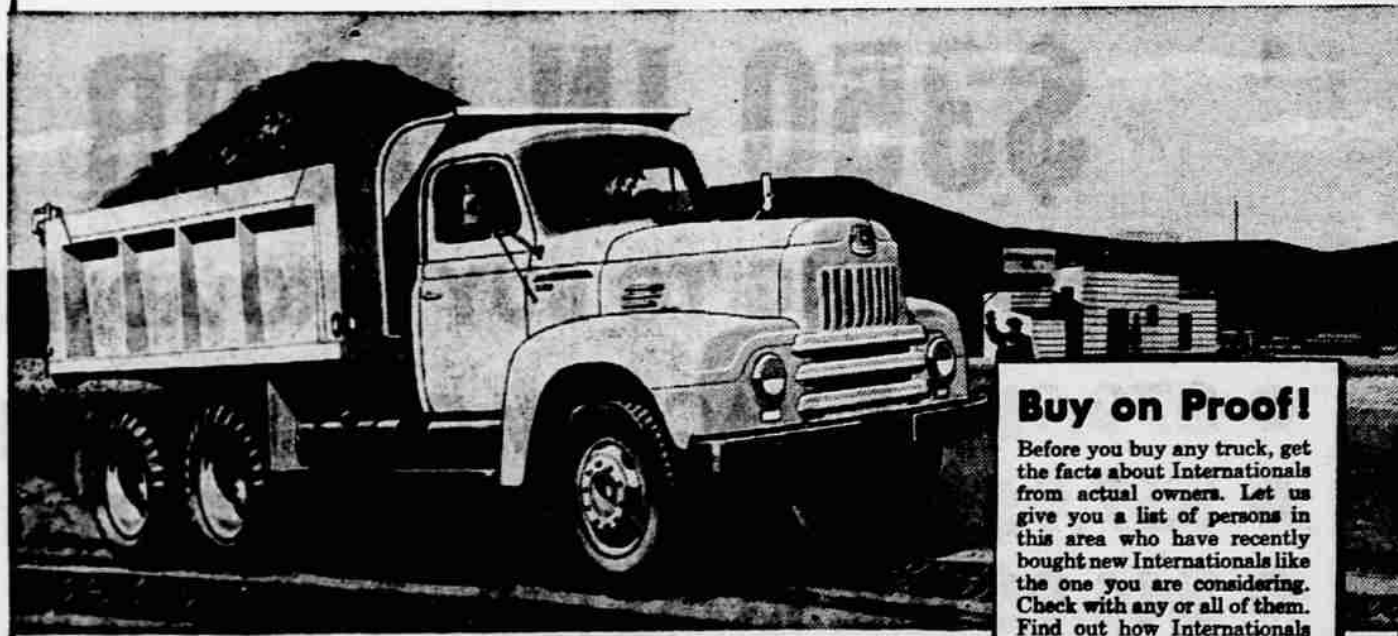
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
