Postcard Quantity Purchase Charge Ends

The Medford post office was advised today that it no longer need charge 10 per cent more for post cards purchased in quantities of 50 or more.

Congress has passed a bill repealing the provisions enacted last year, and which drew a storm of criticism from those who maintain that quantity purchases should cost no more than small-lot purchases.

The new ruling was effective March 22, although official word of it did not arrive here until today.

Mrs. H. D. Kilham, Applegate Native, Dies in Portland

Last rites were held today in Portland for Mrs. Howard D. Kilham, 79, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kasper Kubli, pioneer Applegate valley couple. Mrs. Kilham was the widow of a Portland merchant and, almost until the time of her death, she had managed the Kilham's Stationery and Printing company in Portland for 22 years following her husband's death.

Mrs. Kilham was born in the Applegate where her father operated the Trading Post of Applegate Valley, which was also a supper stop for the stage coming from Crescent City to Jacksonville. Gold scales used at the store are now at the Jacksonville Museum.

It was at that store that another pioneer valley couple met. The late Peter Britt was there to meet his future wife when she arrived from the east to San Francisco and then from Crescent City by stage. They were married at the Kasper Kubli home.

Operated Old Store

Mrs. Kilham's father later operated a hardware store at Jacksonville and made the ornate trimmings on the Jacksonville Presbyterian church building. He was born in Switzerland.

Mrs. Kilham's mother was the former Eleanor J. Newcomb, and she and Kasper Kubli were married Dec. 27, 1857. The mother died May 16, 1926.

Mrs. Kilham was a graduate of St. Helen's Hall school for girls and an active supporter of the Christian Science church. She was an early member of the Portland branch.

She is survived by a son, Horace K. Kilham; two daughters, Mrs. Howard H. Hymes and Mrs. Albert Steinger; a sister, Mrs. Phil Mettschan, and five grandchildren, all of Portland. A third daughter, Mrs. J. R. Draudt, is deceased.

Barbershop Quartet Show Draws Capacity Audience Saturday

The Barbershop Parade of Quartets, held at the high school auditorium Saturday evening, was delayed in starting for nearly a half hour so that a more-than-capacity crowd could be accommodated.

Extra chairs were put up in the auditorium, in addition to four rows of chairs already in place in the front of the audience section. Members of the Medford chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, sponsors of the show, said the attendance exceeded their expectations.

Many Participate

The enthusiastic crowd saw a show which featured two full choruses, one from Medford, the other from Brookings, Ore., and 13 quartets from all parts of Oregon, and from California.

The 2½ hours show was opened with selections by the Medford SPEBSQSA chorus under the direction of Gus Voss. Quartets from eBrakey, Redding and Crescent City, Calif., and Roseburg, Brookings, Bonanza, Portland and Medford, also sang. The Brookings chorus was directed by Bradley Page.

Proceeds from the show were devoted to the purchase of equipment for Mercy Flights, Inc., the non-profit air ambulance service operated here. George Milligan, chairman of the service, was presented with four blankets, a fire extinguisher, and oxygen tank and mask with attachments, two foam rubber mattresses, sheets, pillow cases and a large first aid kit.
