Excavations Show Evidence Of Roman Ties With London

London—(U.P.)—Excavations in World War II's bomb-ravaged historic mile-square city of London has thrown up fresh archaeological evidence of the ancient capital in Roman times.

The discoverers, result of excavations conducted by the London Roman and Medieval Excavation Council, amplify discoveries made in 1950.

Sufficient excavations have been made in the Cripplegate area to prove the existence of a fort built to command roads north and west while the province was still being conquered by the Romans.

Dimensions and date of the fort have now been established. It covered an area of about 11 acres, with an east to west width of 230 yards and a north to south length of 250 yards.

Ditch Filled In

It is calculated the fort was built late in the first century A. D., and was surrounded by a ditch which was still open in the mid-second century. The fort was dismantled and the ditch filled in at a date assumed to be not long after the year 200.

Evidence was provided by coins found in the upper filling of the ditch belonging to the late second century. Pottery was found in the ditch itself.

The latest excavations show three sections of the outer ditch of the fort. Post holes for a bridge crossed the ditch at its southern end. An internal road and a road from the north also were unearthed.

Before Roman Wall

Experts conclude that the ditch and bridge on the south side are from the southern gate of the fort; the road from it points direct to Cripplegate.

The new discoveries indicate the fort was built some time before the Roman Wall. Experts have placed the building of the wall to be around 140 A. D.

THE INNOCENT LITTLE GAS STOVE

A reader asks why not a dissection on the "innocent little gas stove"? Most of us, the reader observes,

have been lulled to sleep by the sales argument that this stove has perfect combustion and hence there are no fumes, and no

flue pipe is necessary. The reader says he wonders why the pipe manufacturers do not warn

the public about pipeless fuel-burning installations. Maybe the vendors of pipeless heaters have

the pipe manufacturers intimidated. Or maybe the pipe manufacturers reckon it would be

like the tail wagging the dog. Since Tony was a pup there have been articles in this column

about the danger of fuel-burning heaters without flue connection, every winter, and some years

several such articles. The reader continues:

"We're all such wiseacres—we resort to the easy method of setting up a portable heater in bedroom or bathroom, at

tached to gas outlet with hose, and with the heater going full blast we get into bed or into

the tub with all doors and windows closed—too often with grave consequences..."

Any furnace, burner, heater, lamp or stove that burns fuel—coal, coke, charcoal, wood, oil

kerosene, gasoline, natural, artificial or bottled gas may, under certain conditions, give off odorless, colorless but deadly carbon

monoxide—a and a person who breathes for a few minutes air containing only two parts of this

colorless, odorless gas per thousand will kill in a few minutes and quickly becomes powerless

and unconscious; three parts per thousand will kill in a few minutes if the victim is not rescued.

Conditions that favor the formation of carbon monoxide gas by lamp or heater are (1) insufficient draft or closed damper and

(2) impingement of the flame on a badly sooted surface. It seems regrettable that the

public schools do not teach enough elementary chemistry to save most of the lives that are

taken by carbon monoxide anoxia (asphyxia) from year to year. The lethal effect is not "poisoning," but just asphyxia

or, as doctors now call it, anoxia—absence of oxygen. The carbon monoxide is absorbed in

the blood and having a strong affinity for the oxygen-carrying hemoglobin (red coloring

matter of the blood) than oxygen, it crowds oxygen out.

Conditions or precautions that prevent or reduce the chance of C O anoxia are (1) free ventilation

of the room in which fuel-burning heater is used—always at least one open window; (2)

vent pipe to convey products of combustion into flue or chimney or out of doors; be sure the vent

pipe or stove pipe is free from leaks. For protective ventilation of

bedroom, bathroom, kitchen or other room where a fuel-burner is used, with or without proper

flue pipe, a window screen made of unbleached muslin is excellent. It excludes cold, wind, rain

or snow but admits fresh air, without discomfort. An occupant of a room so ventilated would

be much less likely to be overcome by carbon monoxide in the atmosphere of the room.
