

Announce Leaders AAUW Conference For Young Women

Eleven Medford members of American Association of University Women will serve as leaders at the Ashland Conference for Young Women to be held Saturday, according to Mrs. C. B. Collins, president of the Medford AAUW branch.

Sixty leaders from AAUW branches at Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass, Coos Bay, Klamath Falls and Lakeview will participate in the session to be attended by 200 high school girls of southern Oregon and northern California.

Four Medford women will each lead one of 11 sectional meetings. Others will serve as counselors at the separate sessions.

Mrs. Niles W. Christeson will act as chairman of a section which will review the place of the young woman in the home. Mrs. Christeson was graduated from Oregon State college and taught high school classes for two years. She served as home demonstration agent in Jackson county from 1941 to 1948.

Mrs. Jerry P. Tobin will direct a group which will discuss employment opportunities for young women today. Mrs. Tobin was graduated from the University of Colorado, received her master's degree at Colorado State College of Education and did advanced work towards a doctorate at Denver university. She has had extensive teaching experience and is presently acting as a partner in her husband's insurance business.

Another section on employment opportunities will be directed by Mrs. Laurence E. Butler, dean of girls at Medford High school. Mrs. Butler was graduated from Willamette university and has also served as dean of girls at Silverton and Baker. She received her master's degree from Washington State college.

Mrs. Alice M. Grace, assistant juvenile officer for Jackson county, will lead a group which will discuss moral and spiritual values. She was graduated from the University of British Columbia and later received her master's degree there. Prior to coming to Medford, she had been engaged in juvenile work in the Canadian province.

Medford women who will act as consultants in the several discussion groups will include Mrs. Fletcher Fish, Mrs. Harry G. Dowson, Mrs. C. B. Collins, Mrs. E. O. McKeen, Mrs. Harold Baughman, Mrs. Herbert Sikes and Mrs. Justin Smith.

Mrs. Justin Smith will also act as one of the principal summarizers of the conference. Mrs. Smith is past chairman of the Oregon AAUW international relations committee and is a member of the state UNESCO committee. She teaches social studies at Medford high school and in 1950 was named by Zonta as the outstanding woman of the year in Medford.

The conference will be held on the Southern Oregon college campus at Ashland. Mrs. Mabel W. Winston, northwest regional vice-president of AAUW, will act as conference chairman.
