## Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.)—Take another look at those "lavish movie sets" of glittering ballrooms... or sinister jungles. They may just be painted on, a top "special effects" man revealed Monday.

Nowadays you don't have to build movie sets at all. The players can emote in a bare room—and let the movie magicians paint the scenery virtually onto the film. Special effects departments at movie studios are verbatim to the press. But one of the wizards, Jack Rabin, escaped and is working on his own.

"Here's one inexpensive ballroom scene actually shot in a room that was almost bare, with columns going halfway up," he explains. "On a 2x3 foot piece of drawing paper I painted the ceiling, the chandeliers, drapes and rest of the columns."

**Film Superimposed**  
The painting was photographed, and the film superimposed over the film of the actors' scene. The result looks real—even to the lights "twinkling" in the painted chandeliers.

It's vital that his trick camera doesn't vibrate, so it's anchored four feet into the ground. "The major studios do this all the time," shrugs Rabin. "I worked at Fox on 'Forever Amber.' Most of those village streets were just paintings."

"Hardly any movie sets have ceilings. It would be difficult because the lights for the camera have to shine from above. Also, a ceiling would add a third more expense to the set. So ceilings you see in movies are usually just paintings superimposed over the film."

**Trickery for TV**  
Rabin now supplies trickery to TV movie producers and independent film makers, who can't afford fancy sets. Recently he himself produced a science fiction movie about a trip to the center of the earth, "Unknown World." Naturally Rabin the producer called upon Rabin the special effects magician.

"I spent only \$500 on sets," he grins. "The rest were paintings." Currently his special effects are furnishing most of the island for a movie about an island that sinks into the ocean, "Port Sinsister," for producers Audrey Wisberg and Jack Pollexfen. The movie features a four-foot tall "prehistoric" crab. Actually he's an ordinary crustacean who grows via Rabin's magic.

He even can supply actors to movies that don't have enough. "Remember in 'Champion' when Kirk Douglas walks through the boxing arena? Actually there were only 25 extras in that scene. By trick effects, I multiplied them to look as if they filled the arena."

## Coast Guard Recruit Team at Post Office

Chief Quartermaster Ed Swanson and Seaman Dick Daoust, a recruiting team from the United States Coast Guard office in Portland, arrived here yesterday to set up temporary recruiting headquarters in room 200 of the postoffice building.

They will accept enlistments through Thursday, April 3. Men without previous service joining the Coast Guard must be between 17 and 25 years of age, and may be married but without other dependents. Enlistments in certain higher ratings may be made by qualified

ex-servicemen who have up to three dependents. Officer candidate enlistments are available to qualified college graduates.

While the Farallon Islands are part of San Francisco, no city official may set foot on them without permission from the lighthouse superintendent.

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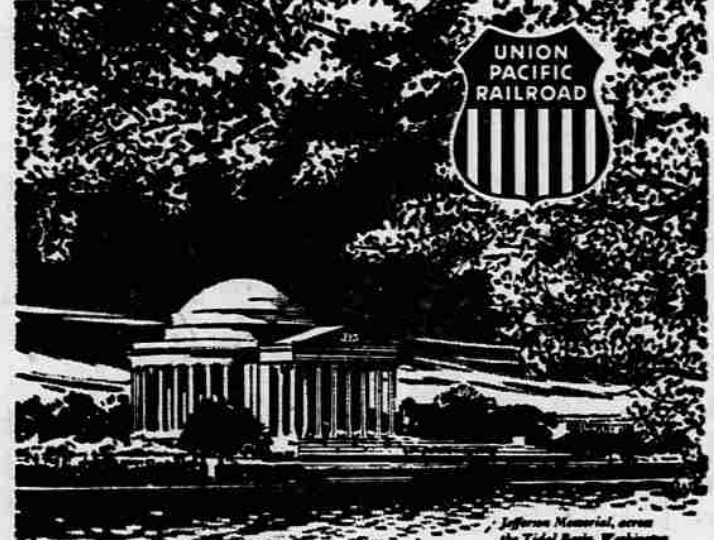
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
